Since 2009, the University of Rhode Island 4-H program has been selected each year to receive a Military 4-H Club Grant. In Rhode Island the goal is to expand 4-H programs and educational opportunities for military youth at Naval Station Newport and off-base sites.

Highlights of the Year



Increased Participation

- **DOUBLED** last year's member enrollments from 45 to **126**.
- Volunteers and staff recruited and trained to run **5** Military 4-H Clubs, including a Clover-bud club for 5-7 year-olds.
- The **3 NEW CLUBS** are located in Northern, Southern and Eastern Rhode Island, giving youth more ways to join a club in their community.

Quality Training for Staff

- Held planning meetings to determine training needs .
- Held **OVER 20** staff trainings at Naval Station Newport.
- Trainings included team teaching, modeling and project specific trainings.
- Naval staff and URI 4-H staff met mid-year to evaluate progress and adjusted the program to better meet youth and staff needs.

Integration into 4-H Programs

- The Jitterbug military 4-H club was chosen at state competitions to represent RI at the regional Big E 4-H Demonstrations program.
- Three military clubs competed for and won awards for entries into all 4 Rhode Island Fairs.
- The 5-7 year-old members studied animal science with hands on activities using live animals brought on-base from local farmers and 4-H Alumni.

Military 4-H Partnerships are supported by 4-H National Headquarters/NIFA/USDA; Army Child, Youth and School Services; Air Force Airman and Family Services; Navy Child and Youth Programs; and the University of Rhode Island Cooperative Extension 4-H Program through grant funding at Kansas State University.

Rhode Island military 4-H youth participated in hands-on learning experiences year 'round to gain life skills. They completed projects in:
