Education

- Choose electives and major/minor courses that relate to your career interests
- Get involved in <u>research</u> with professors
- Build relationships with professors for recommendations/references
- Participate in a <u>study abroad program</u>
- Join honor societies when invited
- Serve as a teaching assistant or tutor
- Maintain a strong GPA

Experience

- Participate in volunteer work or community service
- Try out internships (multiple if possible!) in your field; consider <u>internships for credit</u> during the school year or over the summer
- □ Identify transferable skills gained from work experience
- Get to know professionals in the field through the URI Alumni Network
- Attend career fairs & networking events to connect with employers
- Use <u>Handshake</u> to find internships, on-campus jobs, and part-time jobs.

Activities & Accomplishments

- Get involved in clubs, organizations, athletic teams, etc. on campus
- Pursue leadership roles in your community
- Get connected with <u>professional associations</u>; take advantage of on-campus chapters and/or discounted membership rates for students
- □ Maintain a portfolio with evidence of your work experience, activities, & accomplishments
