And, thanks to the external review and to multiple conversations with stakeholders across campus, we sketched the path for a new direction in Honors education at URI, which we will share later in this report.

Over the course of this same year, I had the opportunity to experience the full cycle of Honors, from an incredible Honors Colloquium, entitled "Just Good Food," to the Honors Poster Conference where 48 students presented their original Honors capstone projects — details of which readers will also find in this report.

And finally, this year I witnessed the hard work and amazing results of both students in our Prehealth Professions program, directed by Andrew Simmons, as well as in our National Fellowships and Academic Opportunities program, directed by URI Excellence Award winner, Kathleen Maher.

Suffice it to conclude that I learned a lot this year about our amazing Honors students, faculty, staff, alumni, friends and donors, and that I am thrilled to have embarked on this new journey in Honors! I look forward to keeping readers updated on our changes as we move to make Honors a force for good at URI, in our local community and for our state.

The URI Honors Program is comprised of three overlapping units that support student growth: the Honors Program, which includes the Honors Colloquium; the Office of National Fellowships and Academic Opportunities; and the Pre-Health Professions Advising Program.

During the 2022-2023 academic year, our primary goals were to:

1

Take steps to re-imagine the purpose of the Honors Program by completing a formal self-study, undergoing an external review, and developing a new strategic direction that would serve as the foundation for a new strategic plan.

2

Continue the tradition of hosting our crown-jewel Honors Colloquium, which entered its 59th year.

3

Support student outcomes academically and socially through course offerings and experiences that are unique to the Honors Program, and that prepare our students to be critical thinkers and problem solvers.

4

Offer guidance and support to students and recent alumni, both Honors and non-Honors, applying for prestigious external fellowships and scholarships.

5

Support students, both Honors and non-Honors, and recent alumni preparing to apply for admission to medical, dental, optometry, physician assistant, and other health profession training programs that require a degree beyond the baccalaureate.

The Honors Program focused on three main objectives in the 2022-2023 school year.


Honors Program Review & Strategic Direction Development

In the Spring of 2023, the Honors staff successfully completed a formal self study and brought on two external reviewers for an assessment by the NCHC. The findings of these reviews are now guiding the new direction in which we are heading. You can find details of our self- study and our external review here. While we have much work to do, we were excited to read: "It is our considered opinion that the Honors Program at the University of Rhode Island stands at the edge of an amazing and exciting transformation, and that the changes achieved by Honors could have ripple effects that launch the University of Rhode Island toward the highest tier of institutions in the Northeast."

Honors Colloquium: Just Good Food: Creating Equitable, Sustainable, and Resilient Food Systems

This year's Honors Colloquium was coordinated by Marta Gomez-Chiarri, Professor, Aquaculture and Fisheries, and Director of the Biological and Environmental Sciences graduate program, and John Taylor, Associate Professor of Agroecology. This event brought together ten different speakers of diverse backgrounds who led a multifaceted exploration of the past, present, and future of local and global food systems through the lenses of sustainability, equity, justice, and resilience. Proudly, the speakers also included a URI Honors Program Alum, Vanessa Garcia Polanco, who is highlighted in the following pages. As part of the campus experience, we also brought in food from the recently appointed James Beard award winning chef, Sherry Pocknett of Sly Fox Den Too. Student Outcomes

This year, we were pleased to acknowledge honors student Lina Al Taan Al Hariri as winner of the Truman Scholarship. A GWS & ISD student, Lina is also a Gilman scholar and is completing an internship with the U.S. Foreign Internship program.

We also offered our first J-term class, a film studies course taught by Thomas Zorabedian focused on the business of film-making. Students met with directors, producers, and writers, viewed 9 films and toured studios and cinemas in this highly experiential course.

In our annual Honors Poster Conference & Awards ceremony, 48 students presented their Honors Projects and 62 students were greeted by president Marc Parlange and Provost Barbara Wolfe as they received their certificates & medals of completion. Student projects ranged from addressing food insecurity on campus, to implementing athlete refueling stations at URI, assessing nutrition education in U.S. Medical Schools, and designing a more culturally-responsive teaching program in elementary school classrooms. We also honored GIllian Hodge '23, an ISD major, as the recipient of the DeHayes Honors Excellence Award.

OFFICE OF NATIONAL FELLOWSHIPS & ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES



Led by Honors Assistant Director Kathleen Maher, the Office of National Fellowships and Academic Opportunities (ONFAO) offers guidance and support to students applying for prestigious external fellowships and scholarships. These opportunities are not restricted to Honors Program students; the office works with students from any student background who meet the eligibility requirements. This includes graduate students for certain international awards, as well as recent alumni. During the academic year 2022-2023 over 145 applications were supported, over 300 1-1 meetings (30 to 60 minutes in length) and 20 workshops and information sessions were held.

URI students and alums continue to shine in national competitions, which the infographic on the following page emphasizes , however, this is not the only outcome by which to measure our success.

Those who apply but do not win or place in these competitions still derive a great deal of value from the campus process. Each year students tell us of how this deep, guided reflection on their accomplishments, goals, and aspirations, has led them to discover other opportunities, or perhaps to realize a better professional path. It aids them in identifying their mentors and in realizing the extent of their accomplishments, as well as any gaps which they need to address to successfully pursue their goals.

And that NONE of these successes would behave been possible without dedicated faculty mentors who go above and beyond to support their students. Two to five, three or oftentimes four, letters of recommendation from URI faculty members, as well as an institutional letter of endorsement or campus evaluation penned by ONFAO with committee support, are required per application. A great letter takes a substantial amount of time to prepare! Boiler-plate letters and empty superlatives do not suffice for these special opportunities. Faculty themselves often prepare multiple drafts of their letters. We wish to heartily thank the faculty who put in that time, and in so doing launch their mentees into opportunities which are often transformative personally, professionally and intellectually.

PRE-HEALTH PROFESSIONS ADVISING PROGRAM

Assistant Director Andrew Simmons has led the Pre-Health Professions Advising Program since 2016 and chairs the Health Professions Advisory Committee (HPAC).

The Pre-Health Program supports student and recent alumni preparing to apply for admission to medical, dental, optometry, physician assistant, and other health profession training programs that require a degree beyond the baccalaureate. Though housed in the Honors Program, Pre-Health Advising is open to all URI students.

The program is guided by four goals: Knowledge, Planning, Reflection, and Application. Each of these goals is addressed through workshops, events, web and print resources, outreach, and individual advising. In AY 2022-2023, the pre-health program implemented 23 workshops, meetings, and events. Around 1,000 students and recent alumni interested in health careers are registered with the program.

Students and recent alumni receive comprehensive support for their applications through the Application Prep Program, which consists of two tracks:

- Track A supports students and recent graduates applying for admission to medical, dental, optometry, or podiatry school.
- Track B supports students applying for admission to physician assistant schools.

Additionally, Pre-Health Advising supports students on special admission routes through the Brown Early Identification Program and The URI-Johnson and Wales Master of Physician Assistant Studies Linkage Agreement.

All applicants receive comprehensive support throughout the year-long admission processes. This includes on-going advising on a range of issues (e.g., selecting schools, wait lists, multiple



acceptances, etc.), personal statement writing, standardized test-prep strategies, and admission interview preparation.

Along with our usual programming and services, In the coming year we look forward to providing more support for students preparing for the MCAT; offering an event highlighting the similarities between careers as a nurse practitioner and physician assistant; and ensuring that students from backgrounds historically underrepresented in healthcare take advantage of all the support our program, the University, and the national health profession organizations have to offer.

WHAT'S NEXT?

As we have alluded to in other areas of this report, the Honors Program is in metamorphosis. While we will continue to offer the academic experiences our students are accustomed to, including programs through the ONFAO and Pre-Health Advising, the new direction of Honors is focused on equipping the changemakers who we believe hold the power to save our world.

Many of us in Honors are parents, and we are reminded every day that we are at a critical juncture when it comes to our planet and our current way of life. Climate change, biodiversity collapse, pollution, threat of war, economic insecurity, declining democracies, the rapid rise of artificial intelligence - these are just some of the challenges our children are facing. We see the Honors Program as a place where students can learn about these challenges and develop the knowledge and skills to be able to confront them. Instead of letting our children enter the world full of fear and anxiety about their futures, we want to equip our students with the agency and tools to become influential changemakers.

In the next academic year, we will begin to take steps towards this new vision, beginning with a comprehensive and thorough review and redesign of the Honors Curriculum. Led by our incoming associate director, Karl Aspelund, we have designed an introductory course for all students entering the Honors Program at URI. The course (HPR124) is titled "Welcome to Planet Honors!" and will introduce the students to working collaboratively and creatively on interdisciplinary solutions for local manifestations of global problems. We are happy that Cynthia Taylor (CAS: Sociology and Anthropology) will be the instructor and are excited to soon welcome our first cohort to Planet Honors!

While our new strategic direction is for now just that, a direction, we can give readers a preview of some of the changes to come. The program will likely become a thirty-credit program, instead of the current eighteen-credit program, in order to better align with national norms in Honors education. Given that our "crown jewel" is the Honors Colloquium, and that the Colloquium spawned the Honors Program, we aim to return to our roots. Moving forward, we will organize clusters of courses and experiences around the Honors Colloquium, which will allow students, regardless of their majors, to obtain a knowledge base in the most pressing issues of our times — the historic leaning of our Colloquia. The skills that students will obtain through these focused courses and experiences will be rooted in four new programmatic goals: creative problem solving, social innovation, interconnection, and policy advocacy. Moving forward, students will also have the opportunity to pursue Honors-level work in their majors as we build in much more flexibility into the program.

As we think through the structure of the new incarnation of Honors, we also aim to create an original program that will set us apart from our competitors. Organizing around the Honors Colloquium allows us to organize around our specific areas of expertise at URI. Our new foundational course will allow us to ground students specifically in the URI context of the Kingston campus, the North Woods and the Narragansett Bay. And recruiting specifically high-achieving students who see themselves as forces for positive change will give us a specific admissions focus that aligns with our curricular reorganization, which will hopefully allow us to improve our retention rates. Improved retention rates will raise the prestige of our URI Honors Program as our students and graduates go on to receive prestigious fellowships, pursue graduate studies and successful change making careers.

Also to look forward to this upcoming year is our 60th Honors Colloquium, which will be hosted in conjunction with the College of Business, which is itself celebrating its 100th year. Through this collaboration, we are inviting students, faculty, staff and the broader community to participate in a forum entitled, "Not Business as Usual: Business for the Common Good." This colloquium will focus on how businesses can be a power for good in our world, exploring issues of sustainability, equity and justice. And as a pilot for our new curricular reorganization, the College of Business is offering Honors students the possibility to earn a co-curricular badge in sustainable business if they take both our Honors Colloquium course and three additional pre-selected Honors business courses in sustainable development. We are very excited about this partnership with the College of Business, as we are about similar partnerships that are taking root with a number of the other colleges across campus.


