

Let's Explore the Google Suite

Learn how to utilize the cloud-based Google Suite using your own device or one of the devices at OLLI. Google Drive, Google Docs, Google Sheets, and Google Slides make up the suite of applications. In the final class we will investigate some additional Google Apps. These apps are all cloud based, so that, anywhere you have access to the



internet, you can access your documents. Participants should have a Google account, be able to download and unzip files, and log on to the wifi in the lab.

Please bring your own device to class.

Before the first class: On your own device, using an internet browser (Chrome, Edge, Safari) go to Google.com. Then either create a Google account or sign in to your Google account. Using either the Google Play Store (or the App Store on an Apple device), download the assigned app for the day. Assistance will be available 30 minutes before class to help with downloading an app or setting up your screen.

Suggested reading: James Bernstein: *Google Apps Made Easy: Learn to Work in the Cloud.* The first chapter is helpful for setting up a Google account.

Writing for Your Readers: Seven Deadly Sins of the Short Story

6 sessions with Richard Lutman Mon, Jun 24, Jul 1, 8, 15, 22, 29 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM

Writing short stories can be a rewarding experience. In this supportive workshop for beginners to advanced writers we will learn how to sharpen our powers of descriptive writing, how to draw on personal experience for story material, and how to construct short stories that will catch the reader's eye by avoiding the seven deadly sins: Telling not showing, weak openings, switching tenses, switching point of view, misuse of white space, misuse of flashbacks, and formatting. Participants will be encouraged to submit samples of their work for in-class critiques.

Suggested reading: Natalie Goldberg, Writing Down the Bones: Freeing the Writer Within (Shambhala, 2005). Janet Burroway, Writing Fiction: A Guide to Narrative Craft, any edition.

Assignment for the first class: Come prepared to write to the prompt starting with the words: "I remember..."

Richard Lutman has an M.F.A. in writing from Vermont College and is listed in the Directory of Poets and Writers. He has taught writing courses and had over forty of his stories published. His novella Iron Butterfly was shortlisted in the 2011 Santa Fe Writers Competition. His first novel was published in 2016. His short story collection Creek Bait was a finalist in the 2020 American Book Fest: Best Books. A second collection was published in 2023 along with a short biography of his Quaker ancestor. Seven of his fiction and nonfiction pieces were also published.

Mindfulness meditation is the practice of bringing nonjudgmental attention to whatever occurs in the present moment, and practice with a group in a supportive environment is an ideal way to develop this habit. As we learn to be alertly and calmly present with our meditation, peace and a deeper intimacy with ourselves and the world will arise. Meditation can be invaluable for coping with anxiety, self-doubt, chronic pain, insomnia, and negotiating difficult relationships, among many other benefits. We will learn how to practice, as well as the philosophies underlying mindfulness meditation and its potential benefits. There will be opportunities to share, ask questions, and discuss our experiences.

Michele Lataille is a long-time yoga practitioner and meditator, and a graduate of the Mindfulness Meditation Teacher Certification Program led by Jack Kornfield and Tara Brach. A graduate of URI and the University of Maine School of Law, she practiced as a civil trial attorney for 19 years and taught high school English for another 13. Now in semi-retirement, she leads meditation groups and teaches ESL at Dorcas International Institute of Rhode Island.

How can we experience peace in such turbulent times? According to international author and peace ambassador Prem Rawat, "Happiness is your own treasure because it lies within you." We will take part in the first half of a video-based peace education program developed by Prem Rawat. We will discover, focus, and reflect on our own humanity and inner resources such as choice, hope, and dignity. To do so, we'll use video excerpts, activities, and meaningful interactions that explore the themes of personal peace and the art of living well.

Since 2013 Marie has facilitated the Peace Education Program and found it to be a rewarding experience for herself and the people she has interacted with.

Ireland: A Brief History

We will examine one part of Ireland's long and complicated history, focusing on the period between 1916 and the Good Friday Agreement in 1998. During these seven decades, Ireland suffered a civil war, achieved independence from England, experienced one of the longest and bloodiest uprisings in the 20th century, joined the European Union, fundamentally changed the balance of power with the

the balance of power with the Catholic church, and became one of the strongest economies in Western Europe. At the same time, Ireland produced some of the greatest artists of modern times including James



Joyce, W. B. Yeats, Samuel Beckett, Oscar Wilde, Sean O'Casey, Seamus Heaney, Edna O'Brien, and, of course, the band U2, some of whose works we will discuss.

CSI@URI: Inside the RI State Crime Laboratory

Dennis Hilliard, director of the Rhode Island State Crime Laboratory at URI, will give an overview of the laboratory's work and the various types of forensics, including a course that is offered to law enforcement officers. He will also talk about the URI Forensic Science Partnership and the seminar course that is open to the public and has been offered since 1999.

Dennis Hilliard has worked in the forensic field since 1980. He is director of the RI State Crime Laboratory and an adjunct professor of biomedical sciences in the URI College of Pharmacy. In addition to administration of the crime lab, his work includes analysis of evidence and providing court testimony related to analyses of fire debris, hair and fiber, DNA, and blood alcohol. He holds a B.S. in biochemistry from the University of New Hampshire, an M.S. in pharmacology and toxicology from URI, and has taken University of Virginia accredited courses offered at the FBI academy in Quantico, VA. He is a member of several professional forensic organizations and is past president of the Northeastern Association of Forensic Scientists.

Marc B. Parlange holds a B.S. from Griffith University, Australia, and M.S. and Ph.D. from Cornell University. His professional higher education career spans more than 30 years in institutions including Monash University (Australia's largest university), the University of British Columbia, École Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne, Johns Hopkins University, and the University of California, Davis. A recognized expert and researcher in environmental fluid mechanics, Parlange has published more than 200 peer-reviewed journal articles. He is a member of the U.S. National Academy of Engineering, and a Fellow of the Canadian Academy of Engineering, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Meteorological Society, and the American Geophysical Union. His academic awards include the James B. Macelwane Medal from the American Geophysical Union early in his career and the John Dalton Medal of the European Geosciences Union. In 2020 he was awarded the American Meteorological Society's Hydrologic Sciences Medal. In August 2021, he became the 12th president of URI.

We will discuss prevalence rates, causes, and con-

sequences of hunger in RI and the U.S. with consideration of populations at particular risk. We will then explore the existing and potential programs and policies to reduce hunger and mitigate its adverse effects.

She holds a Ph.D. in human development from the University of Maryland and has been a professor of psychology at URI since 2000. Kathleen managed the state of RI's Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly Food Stamp Program) Outreach Project between 2001 and 2020. Additionally, she has served on a number of boards, including the Rhode Island Community Food Bank 2001-2007, and the Emergency Food and Shelter

Board of Rhode Island, of which she is currently the chair.

Voices from Native Hawai'i

4 sessions with Judith Gamble Tue, Jun 25, Jul 2, 9, 16 11:00 AM - 12:30 PM Max: 25 \$45.00

Often overlooked except for casual notice by the millions of tourists flocking to their island paradise, indigenous Hawaiians have their own vibrant, complex culture and history. Their story resembles that of mainland natives: early encounters with white Europeans, strong resistance to attempted forced assimilation, and survival. We'll briefly examine their historical experience over the centuries, then look more deeply at the last 50 years and today's little-known second Hawaiian sovereignty movement. Throughout the focus will be from their perspective and, wherever possible, through their voices, including their newly revitalized language.

Judith Gamble has a Ph.D. in history and specializes in the social and cultural history of underrepresented people. She has taught courses on U.S. social and cultural history, Latin American civilization, and Native American history at URI and other colleges. Now her passion has shifted from scholarly to creative writing, both her own and the voices of others.



British Comedy: On the Dark Side 6 sessions with Paul Stein Tue, Jun 25, Jul 2, 9, 16, 23, 30 1:00 PM - 4:00 PM Max: 45 \$55.00

We start off with Kind Hearts and Coronets as Alec Guinness plots to seize the family's dukedom by murdering the eight people ahead of him in the line of succession to the title. Next, we have The Ladykillers, again starring Guinness with a great ensemble featuring a young Peter Sellers, who demonstrates his potential as a future star. Third is The Mouse That Roared, in which a tiny European country declares war on the U.S. in order to lose and get reparations. Fourth is Stanley Kubrick's masterpiece, Dr. Strangelove, satirizing the political climate of the Cold War, again with Sellers. In Phillip DeBroca's King of Hearts we have another great war satire. As the Imperial German Army retreats from a French town, they plant a bomb. The locals flee, and a gaggle of cheerful lunatics escape the asylum and take over the town, thoroughly confusing the lone Scottish soldier (Alan Bates) who has been dispatched to defuse the bomb. Finally, we go back to Peter Sellers in his last great film (and maybe his best), Being There, where Sellers displays a subtle and restrained performance that embodies innocence and wisdom and earns him an Academy Award nomination for Best Actor. Discussion follows the viewing of each film. Did it accomplish its goal? How did the film's style help? Was it entertaining

To add to your viewing pleasure, Paul Stein will email you background material each week to review.

Paul Stein studied film production at the NYU Graduate School of Film. For the OLLI at URI, he has taught several film courses, including Film Appreciation: The Art of Watching Films, Film Noir, The French New Wave, New German Cinema, and the films of Jean Renoir, Alfred Hitchcock, Akira Kurosawa, Federico Fellini, and Ingmar Bergman.

Using material from the Nonviolent Communication Guide series and other techniques, we will explore with others how we might share more authentically and listen to ourselves and others more openly. See where we can embrace, not judge, our desires and where there is room for compromise and where not.

We all love to laugh. Whether in movies, plays, popular songs, or slapstick comedy, music has kept us sane and entertained us through good times and bad. In this course we'll focus on the unique role music has in comedy (and vice versa). From those novelty songs that make us chuckle to sly lyrics that touch our hearts and minds, to performances that make us laugh out loud, if you love to laugh, this is the course for you!

Lloyd Kaplan earned an M.A.T. at Brown University and established the jazz studies program at CCRI where he is professor emeritus. Lloyd has authored various books about music and music history including Who's Who in Rhode Island Jazz: c 1925-1988. As a professional musician he led the Rhode Island-based swing band The Aristocats for decades. As a jazz educator he was inducted into the RI Music Hall of Fame (2018). He was inducted into the URI OLLI Hall of Fame in 2023 and continues to teach many courses in music history.

Tom Shaker has spent over 30 years as a college professor, teaching courses in video and film production, media, music history, news writing and reporting, sports announcing, and public speaking. He is the coauthor of A Treasury of Rhode Island Jazz & Swing Musicians (2016) and, with Lloyd Kaplan, In Harmony: Early Vocal Groups: Remembered & Celebrated (2020). Tom also coproduced the award-winning documentary film Do It Man: The Story of the Celebrity Club (2018). He is a contributor to RhodyRadio, producing podcasts covering jazz, vocal groups, and Rhode Island diner history. For the past 18 years Tom has been the host of "The Soul Serenade," a classic soul and funk show on NPR affiliate station WICN in Worcester, MA.

J. Edgar Hoover: At the Center of American Political History

2 sessions with Daniel Knight Tue, Jul 9, 16 9:30 AM - 11:00 AM

J. Edgar Hoover was a confident, counselor, and adversary to eight U.S. presidents, four Republicans and four Democrats. He embodied conservative values ranging from anticommunism to white supremacy to a crusading interpretation of Christianity. He believed that the federal government could do great things for the nation, but that some people—many of them communists or racial minorities or both—did not deserve to be included in that American project. While Hoover transformed a failing law enforcement agency into a modern one that embodied constitutional values and protections, we'll look at how his personal biases led to the marginalization of a certain segment of Americans. We'll focus specifically on Hoover's career and leadership from 1960 through his death in 1972, a period spanning the Kennedy, Johnson, and Nixon administrations that includes

the FBI's anti-communist intelligence investigations as well as investigations of Black civil rights leaders and Vietnam-era anti-war protesters.





Salve Regina University from 2000 to 2014, teaching in the undergraduate and graduate programs in the Administration of Justice program. In the fall of 2006, he assumed the duties of director of the Graduate Program in the Administration of Justice. In October 1971, Mr. Knight was appointed a special agent of the FBI and served in Columbia, SC; Greenville, SC; Baltimore, MD; and Washington, DC. During his early assignments in South Carolina and Baltimore, he was assigned to investigations into auto thefts, bank robberies, fugitive matters, interstate thefts, and public corruption. In 1987, he was promoted to supervisory special agent (SSA) of an organized crime and public corruption team.

Trees, Climate, and the Lorax

We will explore the relationship between trees and climate. We'll begin by focusing on the dynamic nature of climate and the essence of climate change. Lastly, Dr. Seuss gave the world the Lorax and an important message about trees. That message is more relevant today than it ever was, and it's high time that we take a look at it once again.

John Campanini earned a B.S. in natural resources management and an M.S. in plant pathology-entomology at URI. He is the technical advisor to the non-profit RI Tree Council, a position he has held since 2004. His primary duties include teaching, publishing the Council's "Root Tips" monthly newsletter, and administering the RI Champion Tree Program. Before joining the Tree Council, John was employed for 28 years by the City of Providence as city forester. During his tenure there, he was awarded the distinguished public service award by the RI Public Expenditure Council and the Alfred Hawkes environmental award by the RI Department of Environmental Management.


Get Your Jam On!

Dig deep into the history, culture, and cuisine of the clam cake, which was first served at pavilions and amusement parks surrounding Narragansett Bay in the mid- to late- 1800s, including the still fondly remembered Rocky Point and Crescent Park. Hear about the roadside restaurants and drive-ins that replaced the resorts as sources of this specialty when cars replaced steamboats and trolleys and people discovered the 103-year-old James Beard Award-winning Aunt Carrie's, the 1930s lunchshack-turned-local institution that is George's, and Monahan's, the former bait shop at the sea wall. We'll touch on the touchy subject of tomatocontaining RI clam chowder and talk about musicals, events, and artistic tributes to this local phenomenon.

Carolyn Wyman is the author of eight food books, including The Great American Chocolate Chip Cookie Book, Better than Homemade, Spam: A Biography, Jell-O: A Biography, and The Great Philly Cheesesteak Book,

about the favorite fatty food in her current hometown of Philadelphia. She returned to her RI junk food roots for her latest "greatest," The Great Clam Cake and Fritter Guide. Her nationally syndicated "Supermarket Sampler" column appeared in the Providence Journal and many other newspapers across the country for more than 20 vears. She has also written for Thrillist, BuzzFeed, The New York Times, the Los Angeles Times, The Philadelphia Inguirer, and The Boston Globe.


We will take a personal look at events of the late 1960s and 1970s. We'll reminisce about Wood-

Feminists for Free Love

Advocacy of "free love" is often associated with hippies and the counterculture of the 1960s and 1970s or, more recently, with the so-called polyamory movement. We will examine the 19th century philosophic roots of free love in Enlightenment and Romantic ideals. Early proponents of this movement believed that love was something sacred and transcendent, and that women should have the same rights as men to marry when and whom they wanted. We will also focus on the anarchist Emma Goldman and the existentialist Simone de Beauvoir, the two most important and brilliant theorists of free love in the 20th century, who both struggled to live according to the principles they espoused.

Jane Barstow retired from the University of Hartford in 2010 after many years as a member of the English department where she taught American literature with a focus on African American and immigrant women writers. She also served as dean of Hartford College for Women and taught abroad in Greece and Bulgaria as a Fulbright scholar. More recently she has offered online courses on immigrant narratives to graduate students in gender studies at Southern Connecticut State University. And she has lectured on Edith Wharton, Margaret Atwood, Edwidge Danticat, and Toni Morrison to adult learners in Connecticut and Rhode Island. Her publications include many essays on women writers and the 1997 bio-bibliography One Hundred Years of American Women Writing, 1848-1948. Jane enjoys playing bridge, hiking, and traveling and says her major obsession is the Sunday New York Times crossword puzzle.

The Boeing 737 Max Story

The U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) certified the 737 MAX for commercial flight in March 2017. In March 2019, the 737 Max fleet was grounded after two catastrophic crashes that killed 346 people. On November 18, 2020, the FAA ended the 20-month grounding, the longest ever of a U.S. airline. But on January 5, 2024, the door

plug of Alaska Airlines 737 MAX came out during a flight, and the plane was grounded again by the FAA. Boeing has incurred over \$100 billion in losses resulting from the 737 MAX incidents, sacrificing first place in the sale of commercial airplanes to the European Consortium of Airbus. We will go over the root causes of B737 MAX incidents and examine what lessons can be learned by other large corporations and conglomerates.







The Battle of Tollensetal

The scourge of organized war continues to plague mankind. A recent discovery on the European continent suggests that organized warfare stretches back into what was once thought to be the peaceful Bronze Age. In 1996 an amateur anthropologist discovered a human bone with an arrowhead lodged in it in the mud on the bank of the little Tollense river in northern Germany. Preliminary digs led to a systematic investigation beginning in 2007. The finds have included thousands of skeletal remains, stone and bronze weapons, jewelry, and other artifacts indicating perhaps several thousand people assembled on the riverbanks in what might be the earliest documented battle in human history (1250 BCE). Although DNA and isotopic studies of teeth have not been completed, preliminary results suggest that many of the participants had come from hundreds of miles away to fight. Many of the skeletons had wounds that had healed suggesting involvement in previous battles. We will discuss the results and hypotheses about the battle itself and human violence arising from this most important discovery.

Ken Johnson is an internationally known retired chemical oceanographer and a first-generation Swedish-American. He holds B.S. and M.S. degrees (URI and the University of Minnesota), and an honorary Ph.D. from the University of Gothenburg. He has given many talks on Swedish history for the OLLI at URI. In addition, he has been a long-term guide in Newport, RI, working in the Newport Mansions for 9 years, and as a step-on bus guide for 12 years giving tours in English and German for the Miami based firms Destinations North America, Intercruises, and JRickers Travel Concepts.

I Just Took a Pill...What Happens to It?

Many of us frequently take oral medications. Did you ever wonder what happens next to that tablet or capsule?

Does the medicine dissolve in your stomach?
How does the medicine get to where it needs to go? Why are some

medicines taken once a day while others are taken more frequently? We'll answer these and other questions by following the arduous voyage the pill takes through the hostile environment of the stomach to the intestines, where absorption occurs, and then to the liver and on

to delivery into the blood circulation and tissues to provide that intended effect. We will also touch upon other routes of dosing such as intravenous and intramuscular injections and why they are preferred in some circumstances.

John Janusz received a B.S. in chemistry from Providence College and a Ph.D. from Yale University in organic chemistry. He worked at Procter & Gamble for 30 years, much of that time in drug discovery. Over the next 10 years, he joined two small biotech firms, Akebia Therapeutics followed by Aerpio Pharmaceuticals. He has been chair of the Cincinnati chapter of the American Chemical Society, and was an adjunct professor of chemistry at the University of Cincinnati and Xavier University. He is the co-author of more than 50 publications and patents.



How Society Makes or Breaks Belief: A Modern History of Culture, Christianity, and Communication

Not far from the River Liffey and center of Dublin, John Kendrick stood before his attentive audience almost 200 years ago. Directly following the auspicious fifth meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, his words offer a contemporary appeal to this course: "If religion were nothing but a blind assent to that which we do not and cannot understand...it might reasonably be viewed with suspicion by those who regard reason as the noblest prerogative of man...But true religion is the employment of the understanding upon the most exalted subjects by which it can be occupied, the sublimest truths which it can comprehend; religious sentiments are most closely allied to those which are the most pure and perfect part of our nature..." Here within the nexus of Christianity and culture—where social science meets theology—a dialogue is produced delving straight to the core of what builds, breaks, and transforms a system of belief. Research emphasizes the social science recognition of religious belief as a vital means to the formation and livelihood of a society, while the break from spiritual grounding eventuates in the wildly unexpected. Lecture and a variety of media will support the comparison and contrast of human behavioral and theological works including Weber, Freud, Niebuhr, Bellah, and Taylor while concise weekly readings frame discussion for students of belief and nonbelief alike.

Note: Short readings will be provided by the instructor after each session in preparation for the following classes.

Stories will be provided electronically by the instructor and participants should read the assigned stories in advance of each class.

A columnist for BookPage for two decades, he is also a published novelist and award-winning, internationally produced playwright. He teaches at OLLI programs across the country.




about basic photo editing and recommended photo editing software. And you will also receive constructive feedback on your photos during the last session.

Only Hope: My Mother and the Holocaust Brought to Light

Before she died in 1974, Felicia Bornstein Lubliner wrote about her internment in ghettos and concentration camps (Auschwitz and Gross-Rosen) in Nazi-occupied Poland. Her powerful stories have been published by her son, Irving Lubliner, who also contributed the foreword and afterword to *Only Hope: A Survivor's Stories of the Holocaust*. He will share excerpts, shedding light on his mother's experiences and indomitable spirit, as well as his own experience as a child of Holocaust survivors.

Irving Lubliner is a professor emeritus at Southern Oregon University, where his specialty was mathematics education. During his 40-year career in education, he taught math at all levels, kindergarten through graduate school, led seminars for teachers in 39 states, and gave over 350 conference presentations, including several keynote addresses. Since his retirement in 2014, he has taught math, blues harmonica, and literature classes for the OLLI program at Southern Oregon University, where he has also served on the Council of Directors. In 2019, he created Felabra Press and published his mother's writings about her experiences during the Holocaust, the book that will serve as the theme for his presentation.





Declining Bees and Insects: How You Can Help

1 session with Steven Alm

Fri, Aug 9

1:00 PM - 2:30 PM Max: 25 \$15.00

Insects are enormously important as food for other organisms (birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians, etc.) and many insect populations are in decline. A graduate student working with Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of Bringing Nature Home: How You Can Sustain Wildlife with Native Plants, found that it takes 6,000 to 9,000 caterpillars to rear one clutch of chickadees. We need a lot of insects for a healthy ecosystem. We'll explore the suspected causes of massive insect declines and what we can do to help. We'll hear about current bee and flower research at URI and declines in other insects, then go outside to see the bees and pollinator plantings. We'll come away with recommendations for pollinator planting for the yellow bumble bee, monarch butterflies, and other pollinators and insects.

Note: This class meets at East Farm. The outdoor walk is over uneven ground.

Suggested Reading: Oliver Milman, *The Insect Crisis:* The Fall of the Tiny Empires that Run the World (Atlantic Books, 2022).

Steven Alm is professor of entomology at URI, with B.S. and M.S. degrees from the State University of New York, College of Environmental Science and Forestry, Syracuse, and Ph.D. from the Ohio State University. His current research is focused on surveying the native bees of Rhode Island, selecting and establishing pollinator habitat to conserve native bees, and finding novel methods for control of the parasitic Varroa mite that feeds on honeybees and may transmit up to five viruses.
