

Prospective students and students from the fall 2024 semester must have a working knowledge of speaking, writing, listening, reading, and grammar, including present and past tenses. We'll continue with further thematic vocabulary; learning/utilizing imperfect, future, and conditional verb tenses; commands; and readings for improved pronunciation and oral dialogues/presentations. Culture is always included. Student oral participation during the class and risk taking are important in learning and building confidence while having fun with La Bella Lingua!!!

A Small Town's Brush with Nuclear Power

2 sessions with Brian Mitchell Mon, April 7, 14 11:00 AM - 1:00 PM

A proposal to build a twin-reactor nuclear power plant behind a barrier beach in Charlestown, RI, came very close to fruition in the mid-1970s. Citizens organized just in time to play an important role in defeating the power company's plans. What part did a small weekly newspaper play in this story and what does the decline in community journalism mean for the future of our state, cities, and towns?

Brian F. Mitchell, a URI graduate with a B.A. in Journalism/ Political science, served as the first editor of the Chariho Times weekly newspaper for the Wilson Publishing Company and was a copy/section editor for 20 years at The Day newspaper in New London. After retirement from newspapers, he served as manager of the Kingston Chamber Music Festival for 16 years.



Haiti and Its People: A Positive Spin 4 sessions with Judith Gamble Mon, April 7, 14, 21, 28 11:30 AM - 1:00 PM Max: 25 Fee: \$45.00

During the last presidential campaign, Haitian immigrants were singled out for particularly negative rhetoric. Yet this view is really not all that new. For 225, years the U.S. has had a rocky relationship with Haiti ever since a successful slave rebellion created the world's first black republic in 1804. This course seeks to provide a balanced historical look into this small nation, including the many positives—not by neglecting the tumultuous political and natural disasters and class conflict suffered by the Haitian people, but by also giving voice to a proud and resilient people, both on the island and in the waves of Haitians who have immigrated to the U.S. for well over 100 years.

Judith Gamble has a Ph.D. in History and specializes in the social and cultural history of underrepresented people. She has taught courses on U.S. social and cultural history, Latin American civilization, and Native American history at URI and other colleges. Now her passion has shifted from scholarly to creative writing, both her own and the voices of others.

Walking Rhode Island: Hikes in the Spring 1 session with John Kostrzewa Mon, April 21 10:00 AM - 11:30 AM

Max: 45 Fee \$15.00

John Kostrzewa, who writes the monthly "Walking Rhode Island" column for *The Providence Journal*, has been hiking across the state for decades. He'll share how and why he started, where he has hiked, and what he has learned on the trail. He'll discuss the history of the areas where he has hiked, including what makes Rl's trails unique, and the variety of birds, trees, and geological features he has found. He'll also offer recommendations about where to walk in the spring and point out what you need to bring with you. Kostrzewa has compiled some of his columns into a book, *Walking Rhode Island - 40 Hikes for Nature and History Lovers*, with pictures, GPS coordinates, and trail maps.

Suggested reading: The class will read several "Walking Rhode Island" columns. Links to the selected columns will be e-mailed to registered students before the class.

John Kostrzewa worked for 45 years in the newspaper industry, including the last 29 at The Providence Journal as a business reporter, columnist, business editor, and assistant managing editor. He retired from the Journal in 2017, and spent the next three years as an adjunct professor at Bryant University, where he taught a writing workshop course to first-year students. In 2020, he began writing freelance stories for the Journal about business and economics during the pandemic. In January 2021, he launched "Walking Rhode Island," a weekly column online and in the Sunday newspaper, about hiking in the state. Since then, he has written 100 columns. A College of the Holy Cross graduate, Kostrzewa also worked at the Worcester Post, Lawrence Eagle-Tribune, and Akron (Ohio) Beacon Journal. He and his wife, Carol, live in Cranston.

A Gilded Age Tale of Seduction, Betrayal, and Revenge 1 session with Kay Adams and Nancy Markey Mon, April 21

In 1882, a young Black woman named Annie Cutler leaves her quiet life in Newport to follow her dashing new boyfriend to Philadelphia with the belief that they will soon be married. Unfortunately, her fiancé turns out to be a philandering scam artist who leaves the naive young girl ruined, penniless, and humiliated. Follow the story of

Annie Cutler's betrayal, her revenge, and the aftermath of her actions. Cutler was the first woman in Pennsylvania history to be sentenced to hang, prompting powerful 19th-century



civil rights leaders and anti-death penalty advocates to join forces to try and save Cutler's life.

Kay Adams, a retired banking executive, joined forces with her lifelong friend, Nancy Markey, to research and write stories that shed light on little known events of the late 19th century, available at gildedageauthors.com. Their work has been published on the online platform Narratively and reprinted in Smithsonian magazine. Their first novel is awaiting publication.


Introduction to DNA Cloning for the Nonscientist

Following a research stint at the Roger Williams Cancer Center in Providence, he worked in industry at BIOS Laboratories/Genaissance Pharmaceuticals in New Haven, CT before joining the staff of the Rhode Island State Health Lab where he managed the molecular biology lab and served as head of the clinical lab section.

CSI@URI: Inside the RI State Crime Laboratory

Dennis Hilliard, director of the Rhode Island State Crime Laboratory at URI, will give an overview of the laboratory's work and the various types of forensics, including a course that is offered to law enforcement officers. He will also talk about the URI Forensic Science



Partnership and the seminar course that is open to the public and has been offered since 1999.

Dennis Hilliard has worked in the forensic field since 1980. He is director of the Rhode Island State Crime Laboratory and an adjunct professor of biomedical sciences in the URI College of Pharmacy. In addition to administration of the crime lab, his work includes analysis of evidence and court testimony related to analyses of fire debris, hair and fiber, DNA, and blood alcohol. He holds a B.S. in biochemistry from the University of New Hampshire, an M.S. in pharmacology and toxicology from URI, and has taken University of Virginia accredited courses offered at the FBI academy in Quantico, Virginia. He is a member of several professional forensic organizations and is past president of the NorthEastern Association of Forensic Scientists (NEAFS).

Inside Mental Illness

1 session with Penny Ferrara Mon, May 19

Penny Ferrara will present NAMI (the National Alliance on Mental Illness) Rhode Island's Inside Mental Illness program, an in-depth, interactive teaching program about



mental illness. We will discuss how to recognize signs of mental illness, how stigma can prevent people from getting necessary treatment, and the importance of using positive coping skills. We'll also learn how a loved one's mental illness can affect a family member or friend and we'll have a speaker share their lived experience with an opportunity for a robust discussion.

Penny Ferrara has a B.A. in Human Development from Boston College. She has been employed at NAMI (the National Alliance on Mental Illness) Rhode Island for the last 15 years as manager of school and public education programs. She believes education is the best way to break down the stigma surrounding mental illness.



Mary Katherine Goddard: The Only Woman Whose Name is on the Declaration of Independence

1 session with Marilyn Harris Mon, May 19 11:30 AM - 1:00 PM

While you may know that the Declaration of Independence was adopted on July 4, 1776, did you realize that for several months after the text was first made public, the names of the signers were withheld for fear of reprisal? Or that a woman's name appeared on the first copy of the Declaration which published those names? At this lecture you'll have the opportunity to "meet" that woman, Mary Katherine Goddard, as interpreted by local historian, Marilyn Harris.

Marilyn Harris, a many times transplanted Midwesterner, earned her undergraduate degree at the University of Illinois and master's at Kutztown University (PA). Her work in education—federal project management, curriculum writing, and gifted/talented teaching—spans more than 50 years. Since 2011 she has taught over 30 classes for OLLI and was inducted into the OLLI Hall of Fame in 2023. Marilyn's particular interests include travel (she has visited over a dozen countries and counting) and history; these form the basis of many of her courses.

Human Decision-Making: Insights from Behavioral Economics

2 sessions with Peter Nightingale Mon, June 2, 9 9:30 AM - 11:00 AM Max: 45 Fee: \$35.00

This course explores the flaws in human decision-making through the groundbreaking work of Daniel Kahneman, Amos Tversky, and Richard Thaler. Kahneman and Tversky, whose work began decades ago, identified biases like "availability bias," where we judge importance based on what's most visible, and showed how humans often fail to avoid statistical errors in reasoning. Their insights reshaped economics by challenging the rational "economic actor" model, though their work has faced criticism for implicit elitism. No technical background is needed—just curiosity about how these ideas impact our lives and the policies around us.

Assignment: Read Kahneman's autobiographical essay at least through the section *The Military Experience*.

Suggested reading: Daniel Kahneman: *Thinking Fast and Slow* (Farrar, Straus and Giroux, 2011). Richard H. Thaler and Cass R. Sunstein: Nudg (Yale University Press, 2021).

Peter Nightingale is a theoretical physicist specializing in computational methods. He earned his Ph.D. at the University of Amsterdam in The Netherlands. After postdoctoral positions in Delft and Seattle, he ended up at URI, where he has been since 1983. In recent years, his focus has been social justice, war, peace, and climate chaos. of Sweden and Denmark.

Ken Johnson is an internationally known retired chemical oceanographer and a first-generation Swedish-American. He holds B.S. and M.S. degrees (URI and the University of Minnesota, respectively), and an honorary Ph.D. from the University of Gothenburg, Sweden. He has given many talks on Swedish history for the OLLI. In addition, he has been a long-term guide in Newport, RI, working in the Newport mansions for 9 years, and as a step-on bus guide for 12 years giving tours in English and German for the Miami-based firms, Destinations North America, Intercruises, and JRickers Travel Concepts.



Zora Neale Hurston: Their Eyes Were Watching God and Selected Stories

Zora Neale Hurston (1891-1960) is a vibrant writer known for her contributions to the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s and for her influence on writers following her such as Alice Walker. Having had the unique experience of growing up in the all-Black community of Eatonville, Florida, Hurston imbibed the spirit of living in a place where racial discrimination did not exist although gender discrimination did. This history helped create her complicated but essentially positive view of Black life that is the subject matter of her fiction. In this course, we will look closely at the thought and construction of her masterpiece, *Their Eyes Were Watching God*, and at selected short stories.

Underwater Archaeology

We'll explore the history and practice of underwater archaeology with a focus on the ancient Mediterranean. Discussion topics will include classical underwater archaeology, how to find ancient shipwrecks, Israel and King Herod's Harbor, East Africa and the forbidden voyage, and the deepwater archaeology of RMS Titanic.

Note: This class meets twice a week for three weeks.

New Zealander **Bridget Buxton** is a Professor of History and Archaeological Oceanography at URI, an AAUS scientific diver, and a Fulbright scholar with a PhD from Berkeley. At URI she teaches Classics and Ancient Mediterranean History as well as Archaeology. Her recent research projects and underwater archaeology field expeditions span civilizations and oceans, with a particular focus on Israel and the Eastern Mediterranean, Croatia, and East Africa, and RMS Titanic.

Iran, Iraq, and Syria

This course provides an in-depth analysis of the major conflicts in Iran, Iraq, and Syria from World War I to the present day. We will explore the historical, political, and social dynamics that have shaped these countries and their roles in regional and global affairs. We will spend two classes in each country examining topics such as

the CIA-backed coup that ousted Prime Minister Mohammad Mossadegh in 1953, the Iran-Iraq War (1980-1988), Iran's unique role and challenges as a regional power,



and its nuclear development program and the international response. The section on Syria will investigate the leadership of Bashar al-Assad, the impact of the Arab Spring on Syria, and the ongoing Syrian Civil War, including its key players and humanitarian impact.

Jim Buxton taught global studies and international relations at South Kingstown High School for 32 years. During that stretch, he earned numerous teaching awards, including the RI HS Social Studies Teacher of the Year in 1997, and the RI HS Girls Soccer Coach of the Year in 1988. In 1997-98, he taught in England under the Fulbright Teacher Exchange program. His Model UN program lasted 19 years and, at its height, included 380 students from 25 schools. After HS teaching, he taught International politics courses in the URI Political Science Department. From 2009 until 2016, he also taught in the Salve Regina Education Department, and supervised HS social studies student teachers. He has taught OLLI courses for a decade.

Seven Sacred Pauses: Mindful Themes for the Hours of the Day

5 sessions with Christine Phoenix Green Tue, April 15, 22, 29, May 6, 13 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM

In nature, every three or four hours of the day has a different "mood" and a different theme to ponder. It's important to take the moments to silently pause, center, NOTICE, and ponder, especially in rapidly changing and chaotic times where we are right now. In monastic communities across the world, this time of pausing in deep silence and meditation is often accompanied by



chant and prayer. This practice can also benefit those of us "in the world" longing for moments of grounding, reflection, and peace. Borrowing from the monastic tradition of the Benedictine Book of Hours (Vigils, Lauds, Prime, Terce, Sext, None,

Vespers, Compline), we will visit these special hours and their themes, enhanced by some personal journaling/ writing and centering inspired by listening to the calming chant of each segment.

Required text: Brother David Steindl-Rast: The Music of Silence: A Sacred Journey through the Hours of the Day (Ulysses Press, 2001). Available on Amazon.

For the first class: Read the Introduction, Preface, Notes on Gregorian Chant, and The Seasons of the Day for reflection, journaling, or discussion.

bathing gives us a chance to quiet our minds while using our senses, helping us renew our relationship with nature.

While the trail will most likely be flat, there may be some areas where roots and rocks make it uneven. Please dress for the weather including hat/sturdy shoes and bring what you usually carry on a walk such as water/walking stick.

Mary Jane Sorrentino is a guide trained and certified by the Association of Nature and Forest Therapy Guides & Programs. The first wage workers' strike in the United States took place in Pawtucket, RI, just over 200 years ago in 1824. Led by historian and park ranger Allison Horrocks, we will examine the long history of labor



radicalism in the Blackstone Valley, focusing on key episodes in local history.

Allison Horrocks is a park ranger at Blackstone River Valley National Historical Park, based out of Slater Mill in Pawtucket, RI. She has a Ph.D. in History from the University of Connecticut.

The Federal Budget and the National Debt

1 session with Robert Muller Tue, May 20

What is the constitutional foundation of the federal budget and the role of Congress and the president in setting taxes and spending? How does the budget affect the national economy? What is the role of debt borrowing in



financing the budget? In the past five years, large deficits and debt borrowing have reached record levels outside of wartime. What does this mean. if anything, for the nation in the years ahead? The diverse economic and political viewpoints on the subject will be discussed. The class

will conclude by focusing on potential solutions and what those solutions might mean for economic growth and the American people.

Robert Muller worked almost fifty years in the Public Finance business, most of which was spent at JP Morgan where he was head of municipal bond research for many years and served as the public finance sector strategist. He was a highly ranked investment research analyst and considered an expert in state and local government, health care, and infrastructure finance. He spoke regularly to both investors and debt issuing clients of the firm about how the federal budget affected various sectors of the U.S. economy and the implication of deficits and debt. He holds a B.A. in History from Trinity College (CT) and an M.P.A. from New York University in Public Policy and Urban Economics.

Danger! Molasses in January

In January 1919, Bostonians could be excused for anxiety. The city had lost over a thousand of its citizens to fighting in World War I and at least as many to the flu pandemic that burst out at Camp Devens in September 1918. The world was out of joint. But who could have been prepared for a flood of molasses? Was it an attack by Italian anarchists? Relatively small in terms of lives lost, this 1919 disaster had interesting complications. Gale will share the fascinating details of this unique disaster, taken from a chapter of her book, *A History of Civilization in 50 Disasters*.

Gale Eaton, Ph.D., was director of URI's Graduate School of Library and Information Studies. Since her 2012 retirement, she has been writing, editing, teaching for OLLI, and making repeated efforts to organize her home office.

Threads of Time: Unravelling the History of Block Island Shipwrecks Through Quilts and Their Makers

1 session with Janet Dionis Tue, May 20 3:30 PM - 5:00 PM

The wrecks of three ships, the *Warrior*, the *Spartan*, and the *Larchmont*, are all connected in an unusual way—calico. Calico was an important commodity in the 19th and 20th century and often carried in the cargo holds of ships trying to navigate the difficult waters surrounding Block Island. The windfall of salvaged fabric from these wrecks was a boon for islanders and often used in home sewing. A study of Block Island quilts and the discovery of one quiltmaker's diaries adds richness and dimension to the marine disasters.

Janet Dionis is the director of the Block Island Historical Society and a former literature teacher.

Precambrian Earth

1 session with Ernest Zielinski Tue, May 20

We'll cover the history of the first four billion years of earth from the Hadean eon through the Archean and Proterozoic eons and ending at the Cambrian eon 540 million years ago. Geologic and biologic events during these peri-



ods will be presented along with some fossil evidence.

Ernest Zielinski holds a B.A. in biology from URI and an M.S. in business from Troy State University, with an emphasis on hazardous materials handling and hazardous waste disposal. He has worked in the aerospace, manufacturing, and environmental industries in various managerial positions and has taught various training classes in industry and the military. Currently VP of the RI Mineral Hunters Club, he has given talks at CCRI, Bryant, URI Master Gardeners (East Farm), Mineral Club. His subjects have included toxic minerals, the Narragansett Basin, RI coal mining, and rare fossil sites (Lagerstatte).

Energy Systems and How They Work

How much do you know about offshore wind farms—or other forms of green energy? (If you are not already aware, Rhode Island is the first state in the USA to implement an offshore wind farm, just off Block Island.) Learn all about the different forms of energy, from fossil fuels to wind energy and other "green" systems and how they are produced.

Jet Vertz served as a U.S. Naval Officer during the Vietnam War era and worked 44 years in the aerospace business. He was vice president at Pratt & Whitney Aircraft until his retirement. Jet's been an OLLI instructor since 2013 and has taught Purpose Driven Retirement, History & Future of Automobiles, Histories and Mysteries of Aviation, Global Warming, Green Energy Systems, and Computer Fundamentals.



Navigating News in a Polarized Environment

3 sessions with Bill Seymour Tue, May 27, June 3, 10 3:00 PM - 4:30 PM

This course aims to equip students with the skills needed to navigate and understand the news effectively in a complex and often polarized political landscape. In addition to looking at the changing definition of news and difference between news and commentary, and the intermingling of both, emphasis also will be placed on ethical considerations, fact-checking, and the impact of digital media.

Bill Seymour was a newspaper journalist for 10 years before becoming a state government official working for five governors of Connecticut in communications and policy analysis. He is now a freelance writer for newspapers and magazines in Connecticut and in South County, Rhode Island. He also has been an adjunct professor of journalism for nearly 40 years. He has a master's degree in public administration, with emphasis on press, politics, and public policy from Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. He serves on its New England Alumni Association board where he runs, with the Harvard Law School Association of Massachusetts, a series on Contemporary Issues in the Media for Harvard alumni worldwide.



Laura Foeri holds a B.S. in health fitness/exercise science from Bridgewater State University. She has been a licensed physical therapist assistant since 1990. Certified in pain reprocessing therapy, Laura currently teaches chronic pain workshops for the State of Rhode Island.

Naval Torpedo Station Newport

1 session with Brian Wallin Wed, April 23

10:00 AM - 11:30 AM Max: 45 Fee: \$15.00

Just after the Civil War, the Navy established a facility on Goat Island in Newport to develop and test underwater weapons, from mines to automobile (self-powered) torpedoes. Considerable attention was focused on the station during World War II when, thanks to poor planning, a lack of testing, and outmoded production methods, the Navy's torpedoes failed to achieve the promised results. It took personal action by Navy's Commander in Chief, Admiral Ernest King, to finally remedy the problem. The presentation includes rarely seen visuals of torpedo launches and anecdotes about weapons that went astray of the Bay. Eventually, some 14,000 people would be employed at the station during World War II. Today, the Navy continues its underwater weapons development initiatives at Newport, exploring cutting-edge technology in partnership with civilian researchers and manufacturers.

Brian L. Wallin is a graduate of Stonehill College and earned his master's degree from American International College. He is a former radio-television reporter-anchor and a retired hospital administrator (vice president, Kent Hospital). A member of the U.S. Naval Institute, he is also a docent at the Naval War College Museum and a narrator for the RI Fast Ferry Lighthouse Cruises. He is a recognized author and historian and a frequent lecturer throughout the state. He is co-author of World War II Rhode Island (History Press, 2017).

The Enslaved Women of Smith's Castle

From the mid-17th to the late-18th centuries, slavery was an integral part of life at Smith's Castle. Hear about Sarah, Lille, Sue, Bridget and nameless others who toiled at Cocumscussoc, how slavery on the Narragansett Plantations particularly impacted women, and how they quietly resisted.

Marilyn Harris, a many times transplanted Midwesterner, earned her undergraduate degree at the University of Illinois and master's at Kutztown University (PA). Her work in education—federal project management, curriculum writing, and gifted/talented teaching—spans more than 50 years. Since 2011 she has taught over 30 classes for OLLI and was inducted into the OLLI Hall of Fame in 2023. Marilyn's particular interests include travel (she has visited over a dozen countries and counting) and history; these form the basis of many of her courses.

From its roots in the 1920s to its revival in the 1990s, swing has always been the thing. We'll listen to and watch artists like Cab Calloway, Louis Prima, Sister Rosetta Tharpe, Big Bad Voodoo Daddy, and many others. Come ready to swing every week!

Lloyd Kaplan earned an M.A.T. at Brown University and established the jazz studies program at CCRI where he is professor emeritus. Lloyd has authored various books about music and music history including Who's Who in Rhode Island Jazz: c 1925-1988. As a professional musician he led the Rhode Island-based swing band The Aristocats for decades. As a jazz educator he was inducted into the Rhode Island Music Hall of Fame (2018). He was inducted into the URI OLLI Hall of Fame in 2023 and continues to teach many courses in music history.

Tom Shaker has spent over 30 years as a college professor, teaching courses in video and film production, media, music history, news writing and reporting, sports announcing, and public speaking. He is the co-author of A Treasury of Rhode Island Jazz & Swing Musicians (2016) and, with Lloyd Kaplan, In Harmony: Early Vocal Groups: Remembered & Celebrated (2020). Tom also co-produced the award-winning documentary film Do It Man: The Story of the Celebrity Club (2018). He is a contributor to RhodyRadio, producing podcasts covering jazz, vocal groups, and Rhode Island diner history. For the past 18 years Tom has been the host of "The Soul Serenade," a classic soul and funk show on NPR affiliate station WICN in Worcester, MA.

We will focus on one of Collins' wittiest and most celebrated novels. The Moonstone (1868). We'll discuss the novel in its Victorian cultural context and in connection with the poignant biography of its author.

Suggested Reading: Wilkie Collins, The Moonstone (originally published in 1868, but any complete edition will do).

Carolyn Betensky is Chair of the Department of English at URI. She has published widely on Victorian literature and culture, and she also translates French literary works.

The 1960s: The Decade of Assassinations

He has a passion for uncovering the truth, having spent the past 30 years trying to exonerate an innocent man from prison, and has taught OLLI classes on a variety of topics from wrongful convictions to the JFK assassination.



Watercolor Practices

6 sessions with Pike Powers Thu, April 10, 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15

Let's take apart some basics to creating imagery in watercolor. Aimed at the novice, exercises and demonstrations will cover a wide range of practical and playful approaches to painting. In a watercolor journal we'll record our explorations and experiments to build a practical guide



for creating more finished paintings. Steps include: observation; compose light and shadow; sketch in pencil; mix colors from primaries; mop on washes; and brush techniques in addition to innovating new media and tools. Learn

simple strategies that apply to objects, figures, still life, or landscapes.

Supplies Needed:

- Bring in small natural objects to begin our watercolor journey.
- Come with materials from the list. If not sure what to buy, wait until the first class.
- Watercolor paper pad or book-100% cotton preferred, 90-140#, 11 x 15 inch or smaller.
- Small (at least 5-8 colors) set of watercolor paints. If tubes preferred, select a red, a yellow, a medium blue and Payne's Grey. More on colors in the first class.
- Watercolor Brushes: (not for acrylics) At least one 1/4 inch round pointed, one mop brush (round at least 1 -very very soft), and one or two smaller round or flat brushes such as sizes 01, 04, 06, and 10 rounds and 04 and 08 flats. Assortment packs labeled for watercolor will work as well.
- Palette for paint mixing (plastic Tupperware lids work). Job Lot has good \$2.00 folding palettes!
- Pencils and soft eraser.
- Drafting or painter's tape 1/2 to 1 inch wide.

Pike Powers takes a multipronged approach to her creative career. She has exhibited her award-winning artwork in painting, glass, and mixed-material sculpture internationally. She was a foundation professor at Parsons School of Design, art director of Pilchuck Glass School in Seattle, and past executive director of Boca Grande Art Alliance, FL. State of RI's Birds: An Update

Over the past three decades, he has conducted avian research in over 25 countries and been involved in avian field studies of owl demography, measuring avian physiology, genetic sequencing, toxicological analysis, and large-scale conservation. He has worked on military bases conserving endangered birds; for the Semester at Sea program as a lecturer in conservation, environmental science, and ornithology in multiple countries; and as a professor at two universities.

The Wolf Hall Trilogy: A Study in Power

4 sessions with Stephen Berardo Thu, April 24, May 1, 8, 15 10:00 AM - 11:30 AM

Hilary Mantel wrote the Wolf Hall Trilogy (Wolf Hall, Bring Up the Bodies, and The Mirror & the Light). The first two books won the prestigious Man Booker prize. The books are primarily about the relationship between Thomas Cromwell and Henry VIII, but they are also a remarkable study in power—who wields it, how it is lost, how it is gained, and what happens to those who gain and lose power. Although the action takes place in the early 1500s, the books provide many lessons for today's leaders, whether in democracies, autocracies, or dictatorships. We will use the Trilogy to study how power is wielded, who exercises power, and how it changes over time due to both internal and external circumstances. And the Trilogy provides an excellent cautionary tale about the risks posed to those who are close to power.

For the first class: We will discuss *Wolf Hall*. Although recommended, it is not necessary to read the books for this course. The instructor will email excerpts of each of Hilary Mantel's three books before class.

Trout Hatchery Tour

Rhode Island DEM's Division of Fish and Wildlife periodically stocks trout species into designated lakes, ponds, rivers, and streams across the state. Since 1928, Rhode Island has acquired and managed several hatcheries

specifically designed to raise trout for the benefit of anglers. This is an opportunity to learn about the different trout species raised and stocked in Rhode Island, their life history, how this industry has changed over the past 150 years, and how



it contributes not only to angler enjoyment but also to freshwater habitat conservation.

Location: This tour takes place at the Lafayette Trout Hatchery and will be held rain or shine.

Kimberly Sullivan is a principal fisheries biologist with the RI Department of Environmental Management's Division of Fish and Wildlife. She holds a B.S. in marine biology from Roger Williams University and began her career at RI DEM as a fish hatchery supervisor at the Lafayette Trout Hatchery. In 2003, she advanced to senior fisheries biologist, leading the Aquatic Resource Education program. Her roles have included serving as RI State Coordinator for Project WILD and Project WET, R3 Angling Representative for the Northeast Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies, Aquatics Supervisor for the RI Envirothon, and President of the Aquatic Resource Education Association. Kimberly is currently pursuing a master's in marine affairs at URI.

Walter Massie - Rhode Island's Wireless Pioneer

Walter Massie, a Providence native and civil engineer, became fascinated with the potential of wireless radio at the turn of the 20th century. Ranked among the leading American experts in the field at the time, his RI-based wireless communications company eventually fell victim (as did other U.S. wireless efforts) to the relentless efforts by Guglielmo Marconi to corner the worldwide wireless radio market. This program looks at how wireless radio (and eventually broadcasting as we know it) evolved thanks to Massie and his contemporaries. (Massie's Point Judith wireless radio station has been completely restored by the New England Wireless and Steam Museum in East Greenwich).

Brian L. Wallin is a graduate of Stonehill College and earned his master's degree from American International College. He is a former radio-television reporter-anchor

and a retired hospital administrator (vice president, Kent Hospital). A member of the U.S. Naval Institute, he is also a docent at the Naval War College Museum and a narrator for the RI Fast Ferry Lighthouse Cruises. He is a recognized author and historian and a frequent lecturer throughout the state. He is co-author of World War II Rhode Island (History Press, 2017).

Science Fiction: "Go Anyplace, Examine Everything"

World War I in South Kingstown 2 sessions with Jessica Wilson

World War I is no longer in living memory, but a trove of material evoking the era survives in newspapers, photographs, and more. To mark the centennial of the 1918 armistice, Jessica Wilson organized a year's worth of programming for the South Kingstown Public Library and researched the active local home front. Session 1 will provide an overview of the historical context in which the town experienced World War I, focusing on international, national, and statewide factors, including weather. Session 2 will introduce individuals and events shaping the home front experience, including military census takers; Liberty Loan parades; Red Cross drives; letters home from local soldiers; and the 1919 Welcome Home event.

Jessica Wilson served as a reference and local history librarian at South Kingstown Public Library in Peace Dale for 22 years, managing the library's local history collections and coordinating public programming on numerous subjects. Tasked in 2017 with helping the library mark the 1918 Centennial of World War I, she discovered the era's vibrant home front and is pleased to illuminate it for the OLLI at URI.



Declining Bees and Insects - How You Can Help

1 session with Steven Alm

Insects are enormously important as food for other organisms (birds, fish, reptiles, amphibians, etc.) and many insect populations are in decline. A graduate student working with Dr. Doug Tallamy, author of Bringing Nature Home: How You Can Sustain Wildlife with Native Plants,



found that it takes 6,000 to 9,000 caterpillars to rear one clutch of chickadees. We need a lot of insects for a healthy ecosystem. We'll explore the suspected causes of massive insect declines and what we can do

to help. We'll hear about current bee and flower research at URI and declines in other insects, then go outside to see the bees and pollinator plantings. We'll come away with recommendations for pollinator planting for the yellow bumble bee, monarch butterflies, and other pollinators and insects.

Location: This class takes place at URI's East Farm, Bldg. 75, 75 East Farm Rd., Kingston, RI. The outdoor walking is over uneven ground.

Music, Media, and the Counterculture 1950-1980

The intersection where music, media, and culture met in postwar America was pivotal. The effect they had on each other was unprecedented and altered them in ways that still impact society today. At its core is a classic struggle between art and commerce, innovation and orthodoxy, freedom and control. And it's only rock 'n' roll. We encounter soon-to-be famous musicians, tour (twice) with the Rolling Stones, and witness the birth of the Classic Era

of Rock Music. We will study why it's a story worth remembering and retelling through our personal narratives. Come to class with an open mind and a sense of reflection about when we were coming of age at that time of profound social upheaval.

James Pagliasotti at age 23 became the first rock music critic and columnist for The Denver Post, where he pro-

duced a twice-weekly column and regular articles about music and the counterculture from 1968–1974. His work appeared in Rolling Stone and various other publications. He also did shows as a deejay



at KRNW-FM radio in Boulder, which he co-founded as a freeform station, and later at KFML AM&FM in Denver. He is the author of three books, a bi-monthly newsletter and blog jampags.com, and is the creator of Radical Radio: FREEFORM Radio Archive (www.radicalradio.media). His expertise is experiential rather than academic from a time when he had press credentials and a backstage pass.

Put some music fans in the same room and sooner or later, they will ask each other, "What's your favorite song?" If we talk about Rock fans, there will be some choosing "Smoke on the Water," others "Bohemian Rhapsody," some "Stairway to Heaven," and many will have other choices. With audiovisuals, stories, and anecdotes, let's discuss what makes these songs great, the context in which they became classics, the songwriters, the performers, their cultural significance, their resonance across time, and why it is advisable to wear a black T-shirt in at least one class. From the '50s until today, there's plenty of great music to talk about, so let's build our own top 100.

Emanuel Abramovits is a mechanical engineer with an MBA and has been a concert promoter since 2000, directly involved in many events by international artists, like Itzhak Perlman, Gustavo Dudamel, Sarah Brightman, Roger Hodgson, ASIA, Journey, Kenny G, and many more. He designed and staged many original orchestral events, including an Event of the Year winner and several world premieres. He served as the Cultural Director at Union Israelita de Caracas from 2008 to 2019, releasing books and organizing film cycles, concerts, and art exhibits. He has been consistently teaching online and in presence across the U.S. since 2020.

Introductory Oceanography

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We will take an in-depth look at the ocean, starting with the geology of the ocean basins and how they changed over time. We'll examine the chemistry of the ocean waters and look at the geological and biological processes that control ocean chemistry. Then we will look at ocean circulation and waves. All this will then be tied together to explain the general distribution of ocean plants and animals, especially fisheries. Of course, we will visit some of those bizarre deep-sea critters. We'll look at some important impacts on the ocean including dead zones, overfishing, oil pollution, and the effects of climate change.

Kenneth R. Hinga was a research scientist and assistant dean at URI's Graduate School of Oceanography. His teaching included courses in general oceanography, marine pollution, and understanding environmental issues. He moved to Federal service on a diplomacy fellowship where he spent ten years at the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service, and US FDA Center for Food Safety and Applied Nutrition. He was a science advisor for both agencies, providing technical analysis of a variety of food safety and agricultural-environmental topics for international negotiations. He is also a longtime amateur shutterbug, having had a few photographs published, won first place in a photo show, and shot weddings (for friends). He has given the "Seven Rules" course for a camera store.

Many individuals contribute to history but never get their due. Women and other marginalized groups traditional-



ly received less ink in history books than the "great men" of history who were mainly white males. This course looks at nine women—three each session—whose achievements are not commonly known.

Among the nine women are a scientist, a winner

of the Nobel Peace Prize, a pioneering pilot, a suffragist, a

candidate for the U.S. presidency, an activist for women's and African-American's rights, a British anthropologist, and a pioneering politician from the Western U.S.

Diana Carlin, PhD is professor emerita of communication at Saint Louis University. For 30 years, she has taught courses on and written about First Ladies. She is the co-author of U.S. First Ladies: Making History and Leaving Legacies and Remember the First Ladies: America's History-Making Women. Carlin has published articles and book chapters on a variety of First Ladies and researches and writes on the topics of women in politics, presidential communication, and political debate.

The Essential Jane Austen 6 sessions with Juliette Wells Mon, March 31, April 7, 14, 21, 29, May 5 5:00 PM - 6:30 PM

In honor of Jane Austen's 250th birthday in 2025, we will explore her life, works, and legacy from a fresh perspective. Both seasoned readers and those new to Austen will



appreciate experiencing the story of her authorship through images of original documents and artifacts. Austen began writing fiction in her teenage years, warmly supported by her family, especially her clergyman father. Yet she had to wait until she was in her thirties to see her first book in print. In this course, we will discover what happened in between,

as well as how a household of creative women made it possible for her to focus on her writing and achieve publication. We will consider how and why her literary reputation grew after her death, and we will take a tour of the contemporary adaptations and retellings that continue to broaden her readership.

Juliette Wells is a professor of literary studies at Goucher College, known for her groundbreaking research on Jane Austen. She has authored A New Jane Austen: How Americans Brought Us the World's Greatest Novelist, Reading Austen in America, and Everybody's Jane: Austen in the Popular Imagination. In 2025, Dr. Wells will co-curate "A Lively Mind: Jane Austen at 250" at The Morgan Library & Museum. She has also edited anniversary editions of Persuasion and Emma, with Mansfield Park forthcoming in 2025.

Mainstreaming the Margins: A History of LGBTQ+ America

Over half a century after the Stonewall Uprising, the vibrant and complex history of LGBTQ+ life, culture, and movements in the U.S. remains a focal point of rich discussion and political relevance. In this course, we will immerse ourselves in the intricate history of LGBTQ+ Americans, examining their political organizations, cultur-

al contributions, and the profound ways they have helped shape the nation. This course offers a comprehensive overview of key LGBTQ+ figures, events, and cultural shifts beginning in the early 20th century to the present, highlighting the emergence and evolution of LGBTQ+ identities and activism, and the challenges they have historically faced. We will uncover how a marginalized community has become a powerful force for social change, impacting every facet of American life—from grassroots politics and art to society at large. Together we will gain a deeper understanding of LGBTQ+ history and gain a renewed appreciation for the ongoing struggle towards justice, inclusion, and freedom in the U.S.

Adam Kocurek is a Ph.D. candidate in history at The CUNY Graduate Center. His research lies at the intersections of LGBTQ+ history, labor history, and the history of higher education. He is an adjunct lecturer at Hunter College where he teaches modern American history. He has held fellowship positions at Queensborough Community College and Medgar Evers College, and has taught at Baruch College. He is also a tour guide for Big Onion Walking Tours, leading locals and visitors alike on innovative and exciting tours through New York's ethnic neighborhoods and historic districts. Through his research and teaching, he is committed to illuminating the complexities of American history and fostering a deeper understanding of the diverse narratives that shape our society today.

Future Proofing Your Healthspan and Longevity

6 sessions with Scott Fulton Wed, April 2, 9, 16, 23,30, May 7 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM

Longevity comes down to one simple truth: our ability to weather the inevitable challenges life unexpectedly drops in our lap. Resilience is our ticket to extended healthspan. Western society is entering a phase of significant transformation that will change how we age. This course is a condensed version of Fulton's Whealthspan Masterclass which focuses on the five foundations for extending healthspan and looks at societal changes that will impact all of us. We will distill the latest and most relevant age-related science for a general audience and explain the strategies for optimal outcomes that fit a wide range of cultures and values.

Scott Fulton is recognized internationally as a "Redefiner" in the positive aging space. Accustomed to big systems engineering challenges, Fulton focuses his research on improving adult aging outcomes. He teaches Lifestyle Medicine and Aging, is an American College of Lifestyle Medicine member, sits on the prestigious True Health Initiative Council, and is past president of the National Aging in Place Council. His critically acclaimed book, WHEALTHSPAN, More Years, More Moments, More Money, hit #1 on Amazon, and he is known for creating the MEDAC system for optimal aging. Fulton is a multiple Ironman triathlete and lives in a demonstration home he recently designed and built for the future of optimal aging across a lifespan.

Russia Beyond Russians

6 sessions with Asya Pereltsvaig Thu, April 3, 10, 17, 24, May 1, 8 1:00 PM - 2:30 PM

This course focuses on recent events in Russia and the post-Soviet space, many of which stem from enduring ethnic tensions. The Russian Federation is home to 180 nationalities, many of which have long been in conflict. We will



examine how the Russian state—under the Tsars, Soviets, and President Vladimir Putin—has sought to impose uniformity, often diminishing ethnic groups. Through a historical lens, we will explore the struggles of these groups, from peaceful movements like the Circassian movement to violent resistance like Chechnya. Contemporary Russian culture, including music, cinema, cuisine, and humor, will also be discussed to illuminate current events.

Asya Pereltsvaig, Ph.D. received a degree in English and history from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem and a Ph.D. in linguistics from McGill University. She taught at Yale and Stanford, and has been teaching in lifelong education programs since 2010. Her expertise is in language and history, and the relationship between them. Her most recent book is Languages of the World: An Introduction, 4th edition.

Neurology in a Nutshell: The Brain Explained

6 sessions with Dr. Paul Schanfield Thu, April 10, 17, 24, May 1, 8, 15 3:00 PM - 4:30 PM

This course begins by unraveling the mysteries of the brain. We will explore how to navigate the complex and fragmented healthcare system and discuss strategies for advocating for personalized care. In addition to simplifying common neurological conditions—such as



headaches, dizziness, stroke,
Parkinson's disease, and memory
loss—we will examine testing and
imaging of the nervous system.
The course will also focus on
illness prevention through healthy
lifestyles and provide an intimate
discussion of end-of-life issues.

Dr. Paul Schanfield, a retired neurologist from Minnesota, practiced privately for 40 years before retiring in 2015. He continues to teach medical students and residents as a clinical professor of neurology at the University of Minnesota. In 2017, he was recognized as the first-ever Community Educator of the Month by the University of Neurology. A perennial Minneapolis/St. Paul "Top Doctor" since 1992, Dr. Schanfield has received numerous teaching awards, including the 2018 Community Teacher of the Year from United Family Medicine Residents.



Science Charcuterie 6 sessions with Kjir Hendrickson Thu, April 3, 10, 17, 24, May 1, 8 5:00 PM - 6:30 PM

Some topics don't fit neatly into OLLI science classes—too big, too small, too little, too much, too off-topic—and often end up on the proverbial cutting room floor. In this course, these intriguing bits and ends are gathered up and presented like a charcuterie board of tasty science snacks. This will be a six-week romp through just about anything one might imagine including a little bit of color theory, a morsel of genetic testing science, a dash of airplane physics, some lightning theory, a mouse that turns scorpion venom into a painkiller, current scientific thoughts on origins of life, and a lot of time to explore topics of interest to you. Bring your questions and we will explore some of the exciting nooks and crannies of science together.

Kjir Hendrickson, Ph.D. is a teaching professor in the School of Molecular Sciences at Arizona State University (ASU). They hold a Ph.D. in chemistry and authored the textbook Chemistry in the World. As an erstwhile quantum chemist, their academic work focuses on science communication, the reciprocal relationship between science and society, matters of workplace climate, and matters of DEIJ in STEM. Hendrickson is an associate researcher with the ADVANCEGeo Partnership and is pursuing research on functional scientific literacy in partnership with OLLI at ASU.

Bella Napoli: Italy's (other) "Eternal City"

6 sessions with Dr. Anthony Antonucci & Dr. Hilary Haakenson

The Southern Italian port city of Naples is home to a rich and complex history stretching back to its foundation by Greek colonists in the 8th century B.C.E. Across the

centuries, Naples evolved into a vibrant cultural, political, and economic center of the Mediterranean world, first as a part of Magna Gracia, and later, under successive periods of Roman, Byzantine, Norman, Angevin, and Spanish rule, en route to becoming the capital of the independent



Bourbon Kingdom of the Two Sicilies in 1816. In 1861, Naples's incorporation into the newly unified Italian nation-state as a part of the Risorgimento initiated an era of modernization and adaptation that persists to the present day. In this six-week class, we will examine la storia e tradizioni of bella Napoli-a city famously pieno di contradizione ("full of contradictions"). Aimed at students and travelers alike, the course offers a virtual "grand tour" of Naples through a close examination of a dozen Neapolitan monuments/historic sites reflective of milestones in the city's historical development from its origins through today, including: Castel dell' Ovo, Spaccanapoli, Università degli Studi di Napoli Federico II, Castel Nuovo, the Duomo, Santa Chiara, i musei Capodimonte e Archeologico Nazionale, Palazzo Reale, Teatro San Carlo, and the Galleria Umberto I among others (including "side visits" to the city's best pizzerias, food stalls, pastry shops and cafes!).

Dr. Anthony Antonucci is a global U.S. historian whose teaching and scholarship investigates the intersections of foreign relations, literary nationalism, ethno-racial formation and immigration policy in American politics and culture since 1750. Antonucci holds a Ph.D. in U.S. history from the University of Connecticut, an M.A. in American studies from the University of Southern Maine, and a B.A. in political science from Bard College. Antonucci's scholarship has earned numerous awards, including a Fulbright IIE Research Fellowship based at the Archivio di Stato di Napoli in Italy.

Dr. Hilary Haakenson earned her Ph.D. in Renaissance art history from Rutgers University. Her teaching interests include: social/political commitment in art, cultural myths and geographies, and the intersections between art and philosophy. Her current research examines early Italian cartography and the grand civic monuments commissioned by several maritime cities in Italy. She explores how these maps and monuments visualized the cultural encounters occurring in and around the Mediterranean Sea, and how, in turn, art shaped the contemporary European visions of the world. She has been the recipient of several awards, including a Fulbright Fellowship.
