STUDENT SPOTLIGHT

MICHELLE STAGE



Michelle Stage (she/her), a doctoral candidate in the Behavioral Science Program, will present a poster at the 2025 APS Global Summit late October, titled "Content Analysis of Graduate Medical Education: Applying Objectives of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity from Graduate Psychological Sciences Curriculum" to examine how DEI principles are integrated into graduate-level psychological and medical training. Michelle's dissertation, "Exploring the Impact of Affirming Environmental Cues and Provider Language on LGBTQ+ Patients' Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) Disclosure, Comfort, Concealment, and Satisfaction in Primary Care," further reflects her commitment to advancing health equity. In recognition of her scholarship, she received both a dissertation grant from the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (SPSSI) and the Society for Health Psychology Graduate Research Award (SfHP).

Dr. Elaine Ruiz, a post-doctoral fellow at the New England Center for OCD and Anxiety, and Aradhana (Ara) Srinagesh, a pre-doctoral Psychology Resident at Rutgers University Behavioral Health Care, were selected as Association for Behavioral and Cognitive Therapies (ABCT) Change Leaders for the 2025-2027 term. This program is aimed at engaging early advanced students and career professionals in a two-year, leadership development activity with assigned sponsors while ABCT takes active steps to broaden and improve the diversity, equity, inclusion, access, and justice focus of its work. Elaine and Ara will collaborate with existing leadership to make a difference at a systems level within and beyond ABCT.




ARBITRARY LINES


KATRINA: COME HELL AND HIGH WATER
