## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND GRADING**

The course requires participation in three online discussions and two exams. The exams are not cumulative. The final grade for the course is based on: Three Online Discussions [30%], Mid-Term Exam [35%] and Final Exam [35%]. The final grade for the course is based on the following scale:

**Class Discussions:** Each online class discussion focuses on a topic related to the course. Using the "**Class Discussions**" widget on the course homepage, each student is required to participate in these three online class discussions. Think of online class discussions as your attendance and participation in the course. These discussions will help you to engage with me as the instructor and also with other students in the online class. Each discussion will be open during a specific period of time. For each discussion, you will have about one week to post your comments. Each student will submit his/her comments as a "post" using the "**Class Discussions**" widget. Each post should include at least three paragraphs. Each paragraph should include at least six or seven sentences. Each online class discussion is worth 10% of the total grade for the course. Your grade for each online discussion will be posted in the "**Grades**" tool on Brightspace. You may submit your comments or "post" any time before its due date. The instructions on how to submit your post are included in the description of the first online class discussion in the "**Class Discussions**" widget.

**Exams:** They are based on the course readings posted on the course homepage. It is highly important that you read the class readings very carefully before taking each exam. Using the "**Quizzes**" tool in the top navigation bar on Brightspace, you are asked to complete the two exams and submit them online. Each exam will include several essay questions. Your grade for each exam will be posted in the "**Grades**" tool in the top navigation bar on Brightspace.

**Mid-Term Exam:** It covers Units 1 and 2 of the course and includes 6 essay questions. The exam is scheduled for **Tuesday, June 3** and will be available on Brightspace from

8:00 AM until 11:30 PM. You can access the exam only once and have two hours to complete and submit it online.

**Final Exam:** It covers Units 3, 4 and 5 of the course and includes 6 essay questions. The exam is scheduled for **Tuesday, June 17**. The exam will be available on Brightspace from 8:00 AM until 11:30 PM. You can access the exam only once and have two hours to complete and submit it online
