The ECHO model uses a hub-and-spoke knowledge-sharing approach where expert teams lead virtual clinics, amplifying the capacity for providers to deliver best-in-practice care to their patients and communities. In addition to short presentations by subject matter experts, the ECHO model provides the opportunity to share cases with and learn from peers.

Q: Do we have to participate in all of the sessions?

A: We ask that you identify a team from your site to participate in the series. While we encourage the team to participate in all sessions, we understand that not everyone will be able to do so. It is important that your team has a representative at each session so they can share your practice's experience with the larger ECHO group and bring the session's resources back to your team.

Q: Is the information going to be relevant to my team?

A: We are inviting a variety of sites that care for older adults. While they may not all look like your site, the ECHO model's "all teach all learn" principle ensures you will have the opportunity to get information and feedback related to your specific needs. Unlike traditional webinars with a short Q&A at the end, these sessions are designed to create an interactive learning community.

Q: I have heard that there is an opportunity to present case studies during these sessions. How do you pick who gets to present?

A: The case study presentations and discussions are an integral part of the success of the ECHO model. The more people who are willing to share and participate, the more valuable the sessions are for all. Cases do not necessarily need to align specifically with the current meeting topic as other difficult cases are welcome to be shared. Our team helps facilitate the case presentation process.

Q: Can we just listen to the recordings at some point when we have more time?

A: The sessions are recorded, but you will get more out of the program if you participate in the live sessions. One of the benefits of ECHO is that you can ask questions and share scenarios from your practice and get immediate input from subject matter experts and your peers.
