Minutes of the April 23, 2018 Meeting of the CELS Executive Council

Call to Order: A meeting of the College of the Environment and Life Sciences Executive Council was held at 11:00 am at the CBLS 435 conference room. Members present were Department Chairs Dalton, Gold, Gomez-Chiarri, Savage, Preisser, Sun and Uchida; Associate Deans, Sheely, Thornber and Veeger; *ex-officio* members Morreira, Palmer, and Van Buren; and Faculty Secretary Rice. Absent member was Department Chair Mitkowski and *ex officio* member Silvia. Dean Kirby presided.

Approval of the Minutes: A motion was made by Morreira and seconded by Gomez-Chiarri to approve the October 25, 2017 and February 26, 2018 Minutes of the Executive Council and the minutes were approved unanimously.

Announcements:

Dean Kirby:

- Dean Kirby announced that when CELS faculty and staff are nominated for university-wide awards such as the research or teaching awards, we fare very well. The problem is in the getting the nominations made. All are encouraged to celebrate good works of our CELS colleagues.
- 2) The Academic Program Review Committee (APRC) provided an overview of their activities to the Council of Deans. A summary of their report is provided in Appendix I. A major effort of the committee this year is to update the frequency and amount of data to be collected from department chairs while complying with the periodic needs of institutional accreditation.
- 3) There is continued effort by the Provost's Office to encourage URI's presence in the on-line instructional world.
- 4) Information was shared from the Institutional Research Office about metrics of teaching productivity by college. The data for CELS is presented in Appendix II. There is an apparent need for teaching loads to be distributed equitably among faculty in different academic ranks.
- 5) Admissions data (Appendix III) suggests that we are on track as to student admissions in CELS, not much 'melt' or students accepting admission but failing to show is expected. The expectation is a new record or near record class size of undergraduates. Indications are that many colleges including CELS are at 'carrying capacity,' so unless there is greater investment in facilities and faculty more dramatic increases in enrollment are not expected. There may be greater capacity for graduate enrollment increments.
- 6) There is a case of grad student in college arrested for felonious actions. The individual in question is on administrative leave from the university. In such cases policy is that the University is committed to protecting the civil rights of the accused student while the justice system but walking a tight line of assuring safety among other students and members of the campus community.

Associate Dean Veeger:

1) Textbook orders for Fall are now due. Even if there is no textbook for courses, faculty are asked to affirm that through the online textbook ordering system so that

the bookstore can properly keep track of whether or not there is a need to issue reminders. The bookstore reminds faculty that the ample lead time in notification allows for considerable cost savings to students on books purchased through the bookstore.

- The IDEA course evaluation system is now online and active for this Spring Semester courses, and will be open until the last day of classes. The gateway URL is: https://web.uri.edu/provost/idea/
- 3) Tuesday May 1 is acting as a Wednesday on the academic calendar for faculty to use as last day of class if needed. Weather closures hit on two Wednesdays this semester, so a reading day was devoted for make-up.
- 4) Reviews of all lecturers is now due from department chairs.
- 5) CBLS 452 will be coming offline as a classroom for remodeling into office space; Also CBLS 252 & Weaver Auditorium will be managed differently as to course assignment, no more automatic rollovers of reservations from year to year.
- 6) The AAUP Contract required annual departmental votes on procedures for annual review for 2018-19 are coming up (Before May 1)
- 7) Questions have arisen about students not being allowed to travel due to university sanctions. There is an existing system of student conduct review on all students engaged in off-campus university-sponsored events (e.g. J-term, sports travel, etc.).

Associate Dean Thornber:

- 1) Connie Heird is now instituting an online system of laboratory inspection tracking.
- 2) Feedback is requested on the new grants management software.
- 3) Start up RAs are being allocated for junior faculty

Faculty Secretary Rice:

- Results of the online CELS Senatorial election were announced. out of 5 ballots cast by the faculty of CELS, There were three of for open URI Faculty Senate Seats filled. Bridget Ruemmele (PLE), Becky Sartini (FAVS), and Joel Chandlee (CMB). The fourth Senate seat remains open.
- 2) Elections for CELS committee members will be held at the May 2 CELS general college meeting.
- 3) The New Faculty Senate Committee structure goes into place in the 2018-19 Academic year. All Senate Committees wil be staffed by sitting Senators. Information about the committee structure and service is presented in Appendix IV.

- I. Introduction: Approved process meeting NEASC standards for academic program review performed at the level of the department/academic unit. APR was a concern of NEASC in 2008, the current process was developed to address the concerns. It is no longer a targeted area of evaluation following the recent NEASC reaccreditation.
- II. Progress: Since 2013/14, 29 departments/academic units have completed the URI APR process (standardized university- and department-level data collection, 6-year self-study with external perspective, development of action (strategic) plan and meeting with Provost DeHayes)

2017/18 Ongoing: College of Nursing, Graduate School of Oceanography, Graduate School of Library and Information Sciences, Departments of Chemistry, Computer, Science and Statistics, History, Human Development and Family Studies, Kinesiology, Nutrition and Food Sciences, Psychology, Textiles, Fashion Merchandising and Design, Program in Gender and Women's Studies, Program in Africana Studies

2018/19: College of Education and Professional Studies, Departments of Electrical, Computer and Biomedical Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil and Environmental Engineering, Mechanical, Industrial and Systems Engineering, Ocean Engineering, Schmidt Labor Research Center

III. Change in Department Data Collection Process (Chair Survey)

Chair Survey: a biennially administered to chairs via SurveyMonkey to assist in department-level data collection. Administered by the APRC in spring 2012, 2014 and 2016. In January 2018, the APRC asked department chairs to determine if the Chair Survey is an effective and efficient tool for data gathering at the department (unit) level.

As the result of its review and discussion of the quantitative data and chair comments/recomendations, the APRC will no longer administer the Chair Survey but will instead provide chairs, program directors and deans biennial reminders for unit data collection with recommendations for content (guidance document completion date: fall 2018). This process will remain in place until alternative data collection processes are initiated by the Provost's Office. The Central Data Report, with its benchmarking data from the Delaware Study will continue to be provided by Institutional Research on an annual basis.
