Panel Guests

Debbie Cornman, Ph.D. is the Associate Director of the Center for Health, Intervention, and Prevention at the University of Connecticut, which is a multidisciplinary research center dedicated to the study of the dynamics of health risk behavior and the processes of health behavioral change. The Center has launched major new health behavior change initiatives and the work is increasingly international in scope. The Center serves as a nexus for investigators at UConn and other institutions to stimulate collaborative partnerships for the development of major research initiatives in health behavior change. Dr. Cornman has extensive experience in the areas of HIV prevention and ARV medication adherence. She received her bachelor's and master's degrees at Brown University and her doctorate in clinical psychology at UConn.

Rajiv Kumar, M.D. is Cofounder, Chair, and Chief Medical Officer of ShapeUp RI, a statewide non-profit organization established in 2005 to help Rhode Islanders improve their health. Dr. Kumar earned both his bachelor's degree in Business Economics and his medical degree from Brown University. He has focused his career on public health and is one of ten Americans who received the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Community Health Leader Award in 2009. Through ShapeUp, Dr. Kumar delivers his social networking behavior change model to workplaces worldwide. He is also co-founder of Adopt A Doctor, and a recipient of the Hope is a Vaccine Award from the Global Alliance to Immunize Against AIDS Vaccine Foundation.

Sylvia Langlois is an Assistant Professor at the University of Toronto and the Faculty Lead for Curriculum at the Centre for Interprofessional Education, where she responsible for the development, implementation and evaluation of the IPE curriculum for 3700 students involving eleven health science programs. She is also responsible for coordinating the two-year Building Practice through Mentorship course and supports the integration of Interprofessional Education into the Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy curriculum. Sylvia earned her BHSc (OT) from McMaster University and an MSc (Epidemiology) from the University of Western Ontario, London.

Edward Quinlan, a University of Rhode Island alumnus, has long been known as an advocate for hospitals. He has served as the President of the Hospital Association of RI (HARI), which assists member hospitals in effectively meeting the health care needs of RI through advocacy, representation, education, and services, to ensure high quality health care for all Rhode Islanders. HARI members work collaboratively to improve the quality of care delivered and address issues threatening access to health care including increasing costs, workforce shortages, and decreasing reimbursement.
