

**Joint Committee on Online and Distance Learning**  
**Report to the Faculty Senate**  
**Dr. Diane J. Goldsmith, Chair**  
**May 4, 2017**

1. **Move to Longsight to host Sakai:** The committee has received regular reports from Media and Technology Services (MTS) on the Longsite's hosting. The decision to move to Longsite was to improve reliability, stability, and uptime. The committee is pleased that these objectives have been met. The committee noted that with the exception of scheduled downtimes on Sunday at 5am, there have been very few downtimes and those have been resolved quickly. The more recent issue of lack of access to Sakai in March was a problem of authentication due to URI's network issues.
2. **Sakai Enhancements Coming in August:** We will be adding major enhancements to Sakai through an upgrade scheduled from August 25-August 28. With the exception of the week between Christmas and New Year, *this is the only time in the entire calendar when there are no classes scheduled*. All work done in Sakai before August 25 at 5pm will be moved into the new system.

The IT department has been working to inform faculty and staff of the enhancements which include:

- Auto-save in the content editor
- New Accessibility Checker feature
- Mobile-friendly, responsive layout
- Added layout options in the Lessons tool
- Improved LaTeX support (for authoring formulas and scientific notation in plain text)
- Faster grade and comment input in the Gradebook tool

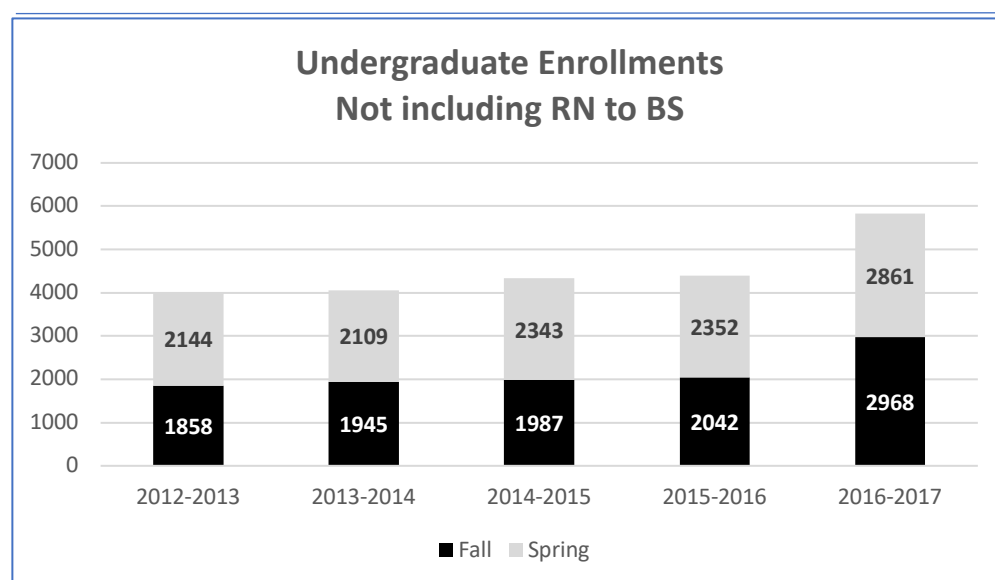
3. **Accessibility:** The committee continues to monitor work being done to ensure that online and distance classes are accessible to all students. We are pleased that the upgraded version of Sakai will allow faculty to check their own sites for accessibility. The Office of Online Education is asking for funding to continue to provide captioning services for videos under 10 minutes in online classes. The Committee continues to advocate for a long-term, institution wide captioning solution.

4. **SAKAI Listserv:** The committee has asked MTS to work to expand the number of faculty subscribed to and using the SAKAI Listserv. This is a primary means of communication between MTS and faculty and in the past served as a very useful tool for faculty to get help and tips on using SAKAI. Faculty can receive the listserv in digest form once a week to limit the amount of emails it generates. Instructions can be found here:

## 5. Expanded Online Enrollments:

- Enrollments in undergraduate courses (not including the RN to BS degree program) have increased in the last 5 years: 59.7% in the fall and 33.4% on the spring for a total increase 45.7%. Summer enrollment has also increased: from summer 2013 to summer 2016 enrollments went from 1643 to 2410, an increase of 46.7%.



Undergraduate online demographics are very similar to URI's face to face classes:

- Graduate enrollments (not including the accelerated dietetics program) have increased almost 200%, from a total enrollment of 215 students in 2012-13 to 639 in 2016-17.

## 6. Expanded Online Programs

- We currently have 4 fully online programs: The RN to BS in Nursing and the M.S in Dietetics are offered in the accelerated calendar. The Cybersecurity Professional Science Master's Degree and the M.A. in Teaching English as a Second Language are both offered in the regular calendar. <http://web.uri.edu/online/online-programscertificates/>

### RN to BS Online Accelerating Nursing Program

- The RN to BS degree program has shown a dramatic increase in enrollments from 75 in its first term, Fall 2015, to 1036 in Spring 2017. Note: these are enrollments, not headcounts. There are over 450 students enrolled in the program in Spring 2017

- RN to BS students are primarily female. Only 10% are male. They are also older.
