# **Notice of Change**

#### **COLLEGE OF BUSINESS**

#### PSA 500 Online Learning in Supply Chain

The purpose of this course is to gain a basic overview of the knowledge and skills you need to be a successful online student. 3 credits.

    - 1. Grading system was a concern and the method of delivering the course. Sakai is still listed. Since the course is being offered in the Fall, Sakai will no longer be available. It should be listed as BrightSpace.
    - 2. Concerns regarding the calendar for the course.
      - a. This course would be taught very accelerated within two weeks for 3 graduate credits. The following course, PSA 501, would be taught for the remaining 5 weeks. The program feels they have a market advantage if they can deliver the entire Master's degree in one year.
    - 3. Question of rigor, 25% of the grade is based on conversation.

## PSA 501 Accounting and Finance for SCM

## **BPS/PHP 547** Precision Medicine & Applied Pharmacogenomics

Not for graduate credit. *4 credits*.
