#### Northwest Passage Project (NPP)

The Northwest Passage Project (NPP) is an Arctic expedition funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF). It centers on a research expedition into the Arctic's Northwest Passage, a sea route extending between the Arctic and Pacific Oceans. The NPP was led by an interdisciplinary team of scientists from the University of Rhode Island Graduate School of Oceanography (GSO) and Inner Space Center (ISC) and a leading film maker. Undergraduate and graduate students will join scientists in hands-on research at sea, exploring the changing Canadian Arctic and collecting data.

#### MOSAiC

The Multidisciplinary drifting Observatory for the Study of Arctic Climate (MOSAiC) is an international research expedition to study the physical, chemical, and biological processes that couple the Arctic atmosphere, sea ice, ocean, and ecosystem. Beginning in fall 2019, the RV Polarstern icebreaker will freeze into Arctic sea ice and drift with it for a full year, allowing scientists to collect data in every season.

Onboard and out on the ice, the scientists will deploy a network of instruments and measurements to capture information about how processes change across space. Coordinated activities from land-based stations, aircraft, additional ships, and satellites will support the expedition. Ultimately, measurements and analyses from this global mission will help scientists improve models and forecasts of local, regional, and global weather and climate.
