### 5. Summary description of proposed program (not to exceed 2 pages).

We are seeking to make two changes to the Anthropology core curriculum.

1. Require APG 427: Unity of Anthropology (an existing course) as a capstone to be taken just prior to graduation.

All of our students start out with introductory courses in each of the 4 subfields of anthropology (linguistics, biological anthropology, cultural anthropology, and archaeology). Students then tend to specialize in one of the subfields for the methods requirement and electives. The goal of APG 427 is to have students consider the discipline as a whole before they graduate and to make connections between the subfields and the courses they have completed. APG 427 is designed to explicitly address the second half of our first programmatic learning outcome: *Describe the historical development of anthropology and be able to characterize how each subfield contributes to the unified discipline*.

We anticipate that discussions in the Unity of Anthropology course will help students think more broadly about the skills they have developed while working on their undergraduate degree and help refine their career goals. Therefore, APG 427 (as proposed) will be four credits; the additional credit will be a career development component, in which students will consult with the instructor and then work independently on a project over the course of the semester (e.g. developing a resume/ cover letter, writing and editing a personal statement for graduate school, working on applications for internships or fellowships, etc.). With the addition of the 4<sup>th</sup> credit capstone, the total requirements for the Anthropology major will be 31. The "Course Change Proposal Form" for APG 427 will be submitted in September 2015.

2. Delete the second theory requirement of either APG 327 or APG 417.

We are proposing to delete the second theory requirement for the following reasons:

- We are proposing to eliminate APG 327 (History of Physical Anthropology) because it is redundant with the way that Prof. Dunsworth now teaches APG 350 (Human Variation). Paperwork to delete APG 327 will be submitted in Fall 2015.
- APG 417 (Archaeological Method and Theory) is also a requirement for the underwater archaeology minor and a theory option for the History MA (Anthropology and Archaeology Option) Program, so it may be difficult to meet student demand if APG 417 was the only existing option for the second Anthropology theory requirement.
- Students interested in biological anthropology or archaeology almost always take either APG 350 or APG 417 (or other high-level courses that emphasize theory).
- All students are still required to take APG 401: History of Anthropological Theory, as well as a proposed new capstone course (see #1 above), which emphasize theory.
- Since we are proposing to add a new 4<sup>th</sup> credit capstone, we want to eliminate the second theory requirement so that we are not significantly increasing the number of required credits for the major.

The new Anthropology Curriculum requirements will be as follows:

### **REQUIRED COURSES**:

- APG 200: Language and Culture (3 credits)
- APG 201: Human Origins and Evolution (3 credits)
- APG 202: Introduction to Archaeology (3 credits)
- APG 203: Cultural Anthropology (3 credits)
- APG 401: History of Anthropological Theory (3 credits)
- APG 427: Senior Seminar: Unity of Anthropology (capstone: 1 cr. seminar + 1 cr. independent study)

### METHODS REQUIREMENT (Students much choose one of the following 3 cr courses):

- APG 302: Methods of Anthropological Inquiry (focus on cultural anthropology)
- APG 411: Paleoanthropology (formerly APG 300: Human Fossil Record)
- APG 412: Primate Behavior and Organization
- APG 417: Archaeological Method and Theory

### ELECTIVES:

Students must take at least 3 elective courses (9 credits). Electives may be any Anthropology classes that are offered (additional Methods courses could count as Electives). No more than 6 credits in independent study and/or field experience courses may be used.

The Department of Sociology and Anthropology offers the degree of Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) in anthropology.

Students desiring to major in anthropology must complete a total of 30 credits (maximum 45 credits) in anthropology including introductory courses: APG 200, 201, 202, and 203 (12 credits); methods courses: APG 300, 302, 412, or 417 (3 credits); theory courses: APG 401 (3) and APG 327 or 417 (3), for a total of six credits. Note: APG 417 may be taken to fulfill either the methods or theory requirement, but not both. The remaining nine credits may be from any APG course. No more than six credits in independent study and/or field experience courses may be used toward the 30 credits required for the major.

It is strongly recommended that anthropology majors take at least one course in inferential statistics (e.g., STA 308 or 409), complete a foreign language through the intermediate level, and gain computer proficiency. Early in the junior year, students who plan to go on to graduate school should meet with their advisor for curricular counseling.

A total of 120 credits is required for graduation. At least 42 of these must be in courses numbered 300 or above. In order to transfer into the anthropology program from University College, a student must have completed at least 24 credits and have earned a minimum of a 2.00 GPA.

Students desiring to major in anthropology must complete a total of 31 credits (maximum 46 credits) in anthropology including introductory courses: APG 200, 201, 202, and 203 (12 credits); one methods courses: APG 300, 302, 411, 412, or 417 (3 credits); theory courses: APG 401 (3); and capstone course: APG 427 (4). and APG 327 or 417 (3), for a total of six credits. Note: APG 417 may be taken to fulfill either the methods or theory requirement, but not both. The remaining nine credits may be from any APG course. No more than six credits in independent study and/or field experience courses may be used toward the 31 credits required for the major. APG 427 is to be taken during the senior year.

It is strongly recommended that anthropology majors take at least one course in inferential statistics (e.g., STA 308 or 409), complete a foreign language through the intermediate level, and gain computer proficiency. Early in the junior year, students who plan to go on to graduate school should meet with their advisor for curricular counseling.

A total of 120 credits is required for graduation. At least 42 of these must be in courses numbered 300 or above. In order to transfer into the anthropology program from University College, a student must have completed at least 24 credits and have earned a minimum of a 2.00 GPA.
